FOR LIVERPOOL.—The barkentine Erema, Capt. John Muchison, sailed for Liverpool direct this afternoon, with a cargo consisting of 818 pieces of hardwood timber, containing 11,565 cubic feet, and 4,950 pieces deals and ends, containing 93,600 superficial feet.

NEW ODDFELLOWS HALL.—A new Oddfellows Temple is to be erected at Halifax, N. S. There is also a possibility of a new building for the order, together with a modern music hall or theatre, being built in this city. We hope this progressive institution will soon give us the needed improvement.

HIS YOUTH SAVED HIM.—Edward Weeks, the boy who was arrested at Parrsboro, N. S., a short time ago, for placing obstructions on the track of the Cumberland Railway, was recently tried before Judge Moore and released on account of his youth.

PRINCESS BEATRICE.—The steamer Princess Beatrice, Capt. Kelly, did not arrive from Halifax until half-past four yesterday afternoon, having been delayed by fog. She brought the usual general cargo. At ten last night she left on return, with one passenger and a miscellaneous cargo.

LOBSTERS PLENTIFUL.—Lobsters are reported plentiful along the western shore, at Mimmigash, Campbellton, etc. Mr. John Hughes, of Mimmigash, is said to have put up fifty cases within the last week, and others are reported doing well considering the backward state of the weather.

TENNIS TOURNAMENT.—The executive committee of the Maritime Province Lawn Tennis Association met at Truro last Friday evening. The Mayflower Club, of New Glasgow, was elected to membership in the Association. The principal business was the arranging for the tournament for the championship of the Maritime Provinces, which it was decided to hold at Truro, from August 5th to 8th, including both days, the events to consist of ladies' singles, ladies' doubles, gentlemen's singles, gentlemen's doubles and mixed doubles. Handsome medals, emblematic of the championship, will be offered in each event.

RELIGIOUS BEQUESTS.—The executors of Charles McGregor's estate, Covehead, P. E. Island, have paid in to the agent of the Presbyterian Church, Halifax, \$200 for the schemes. This amount is to be given yearly for ten years. The Campbell Estate, Charlottetown, through Rev. J. S. Carruthers, executor, will pay by June 1st, \$3,000 for Foreign Missions. The same estate also provides \$900 to find a bursary available for candidates for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church. The estate also gives \$100 to the Deaf and Dumb Institutions.—H. Witness

NARROW ESCAPE.—What was nearly a sad drowning accident occurred off Lot 7 shore on Saturday last. Two young men, John Smith and Alfred Dalton, were out in a sail boat when a squall suddenly sprang up and swamped their craft. Both men clung to the boat and their cries attracted the attention of friends on shore. Mr. Michael Dalton lunched a dory, and went to their rescue with all possible despatch. He succeeded in reaching them just in the nick of time, and had it not been for the exertions of Dalton, son of their rescuer, Smith would have succumbed ere assistance arrived. Smith was unconscious and remained so for some hours; but we are glad to learn that both young men are now none the worse for their experience.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 9.

House met at 3 o'clock. A motion for the adoption of the report of the printing committee raised a discussion on the question of amounts due by certain members for extra copies of their speeches, which they had printed at the Government bureau last session. It was brought out that these debates could not lawfully be charged against their sessional indemnity, as proposed.

Mr. Burke announced that he intended, on the first day of next session, to move for a return showing the names of the defaulting members, as he thought parliament was justified in adopting the wholesome practice, followed in clubs, of posting the names of members in arrears.

Mr. Davin thereupon entered the curious plea that he and some other members had agreed among themselves that they would not pay their printing bills at all until the Government made a reduction of the amount which the members considered too large.

The House went into consideration of the land subsidies to the Northwest railways. The system of granting land without a limitation of the price at which the companies shall sell, was made the subject of lengthy addresses from the Opposition side, continuing up to recess, and resumed afterwards. The land subsidy resolutions were reported from committee.

The House went into supply, considering the public works appropriations in the supplementary estimates, and adjourned at 2 o'clock.

Before the doors were opened to-day the Commons had a long discussion on the House of Commons restaurant. When the report of the committee of five, with the Speaker and his Deputy, was adopted. Among other things the report recommended that the bar be abolished. This is a move towards temperance reform.

The bill to amend the Seaman's Act, whereby rights of appeal by certiorari is given to men convicted under the act was amended in the Senate this afternoon at the request of several boards of trade and shipping interests of various cities, so that proceedings in the lower court shall not be stayed pending decision of appeal. Thus seamen will have to stay in jail until their case is decided by the upper court.

Among the railway subsidies is the following:—A railway from Summerside to Richmond Bay, P. E. I., \$9,600.

News From Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 9.

The furniture factory of A. Stephens & Sons was damaged by fire this morning to the extent of \$2,000.

The southern coast of Cape Breton has been blockaded during the last three weeks. A fleet of eighteen vessels is blockaded at Gabarus.

Lobster fishermen are greatly discouraged. They have not yet been able to take a fish, while the Yarmouth factories have been running since March.

Scott Act in Fredericton.

FREDERICTON, May 9.

Four of the six Scott Act commitments have been served, and Messrs. Smiles, Crangle, Manser and Edwards are now enjoying the hospitalities of Jailer Hawthorne. The street rumors that the two leading hotels are to be closed in consequence of the Scott Act decisions, is not regarded in any serious manner here.

The Sale Approved.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., May 9.

At a special meeting of the Portsmouth, Great Falls and Conway Railroad, at which 365 shares were represented, it was voted unanimously to approve of the sale of the road franchise and property of the company to the Boston and Maine Railroad.
