### Freedom Fighter Aircraft Seen Likely RCAF Choice

OTTAWA (CP)—The American Northrop F-5 Freedom Fighter is the likely choice as the RCAF's new fighter-bomber, informed source said here.

It was emphasized, however, that no final decision has been taken by Defence Minister Healey or the government.

The only other plane still in the running is the American Ling-Temco-Vought A-7, on order for the U.S. Navy but not scheduled for flight tests until this fall.

The main pointer to Canadian choice of the F-5 is the reported decision by the U.S. defence department to buy 200 F-5s for the U.S. Air Force. Selection of the same plane by the two air forces would greatly simplify the problem of spare parts and use of bases.

### Million Return Of Tax Forms Due This Week

OTTAWA (CP)—The revenue department expects to receive 1,000,000 income tax returns in the next two days. The filing deadline is midnight Friday.

A department spokesman said Wednesday that with two days to go, and 1,000,000 returns to come, the situation is similar to the usual last-minute rush to get in under the deadline. The department will work through the weekend opening the mountain of letters.

Some 6,300,000 Canadians file tax returns.

Meanwhile, the spokesman said that about 70 per cent of all individual taxpayers were using the "personalized" tax returns, sent out to home addresses this year for the first time.

The department had originally hoped that at least 60 per cent of the taxpayers would take advantage of the new forms—which speed handling—and officials were "very pleased" with the results.

In the United States, only about 50 per cent of the taxpayers use the forms they receive in the mail.

The spokesman said that most last-minute filers usually owe money to the department. Those who claim refunds tend to file early.

### Fire, Casualty Insurance Firms Reported In Red

TORONTO (CP)—Higher wages, costlier cars and more and gorier motoring accidents are causing grief among insurers as well as victims.

Losses on automobile insurance for the third straight year in 1964 were mainly responsible for putting fire and casualty firms in the red.

The 10 leading automobile insurers all suffered losses on general insurance business last year. The greater frequency and expense of traffic accidents were a big factor. Although premiums were raised at the beginning of this year, spokesmen for the industry are doubtful they will get out of the red in 1965.

Net losses on general insurance business among the leading automobile insurers of Canada ranged to \$6,666,514 by the Lloyds of London group, which earned \$15,996,190 in premiums on auto insurance last year, from a \$29,734 loss by the Zurich Insurance group, which earned more than \$10,000,000 in premiums. The biggest auto insurer, the Wawanesa Mutual group with \$21,000,000 from premiums, recorded a net loss of \$3,464,458 last year.

### Photographic Competition Is Announced

OTTAWA (CP)—A photographic essay competition for the Canadian Government pavilion at the 1967 Montreal world fair has been announced by the trade and commerce department.

Each of about 10 winners will receive \$1,000 and an assignment to prepare a photo essay for use in the exhibit courts of the pavilion. Subjects to be illustrated are geography, weather, agriculture, river, industry, communications, transportation, recreation, nature and community.

Any photographer residing in Canada may enter the competition before June 18, 1965. Selection of winners will be made by Norman Hall, picture editor of the Times of London.

Application forms can be obtained from the Commissioner General, Photographic Essays Awards, Canadian Government Participation, 1967 Participation, Sir Alexander Campbell Building, Ottawa.
