

Local and Other Items.

The steamer "M. A. Starr" arrived from Halifax this morning, with a small cargo of merchandise.

The City Court commenced its monthly sittings to-day. There were over ninety cases to be tried, but a large number confessed.

A MEETING of the proposed Volunteer Engineer Company will be held at the Show Rooms of Mr. G. L. Dougherty, King Street, this evening at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of electing officers and other important business. A full attendance is requested.

The steamer Carroll, Wright, master, sailed for Boston this evening, with a cargo of 67 boxes of eggs and 113 barrels of potatoes. She has on board the following passengers: Mrs. McNabb, Mr. J. Wortman, Miss Feehan, and Miss McDonald.

We regret to learn that the dwelling house of Mr. Frederick Meek, of French River, New London, was, on Sunday last, with all its contents, consumed by fire. There was no person on the premises at the time, and it is supposed the fire originated from a defective flue. Only for the assistance of a large number of fishermen from New London Harbor it is thought many houses in the vicinity would also have been destroyed.

Two very valuable properties were sold by William Dodd, Esq., sat noon to-day. The first was the house and premises on the corner of Queen and Sydney Streets, known as the "Glasgow House." It was purchased by W. A. Weeks, Esq., for the sum of \$5,000. The next was a dwelling house and building lot on the corner of Hillsborough and Sydney Streets, occupied at present by Mr. F. LePage. It was purchased by Uriah Matthews, Esq., for the sum of \$2,650.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, John King, drunk and disorderly, was fined \$2 and costs or eight days. Cyrus Goodrow, drunk and sleeping in the English churchyard, was fined the same. James White, drunk and staggering on Queen Street, was fined the same. Arthur Stanlake, arrested for fighting on Rochford Square, was discharged on his recognizance, as the person who he was fighting with appeared to be the assailant. James McEachern, drunk and using obscene language on the street, was fined \$4 and costs or 20 days. John Taylor, drunk and frequenting a house of ill-fame, was fined \$6 and costs or one month.

STEAM communication between Alberton and the Magdalen Islands is spoken of. From a communicated article on the subject which appeared in the Pioneer, we extract the following:—

"We understand it is the intention of our Railroad authorities to employ a steamer of light draught to run in connection with the Railway from this harbor to the Magdalenes once a week, and to Newcastle, N. B., trip about during the summer. This boat, it is expected, will take mackerel from the different harbors along the coast between East Point and North Cape on a through bill of lading to Boston,—deliver them at the Railway Wharf here, and thence by rail to Charlottetown. This arrangement will no doubt be appreciated by the fishermen at Rustico, New London, Malpeque, Tignish, Nail Pond and Miminighish, who will thus be enabled to ship their fish to Boston at regular periods."

YESTERDAY evening, at 5 o'clock, a little boy named Steele—apparently about four years of age—came very near being smothered in a drain on Great George Street, which leads to Euston Street sewer. He was playing with a kitten at the mouth of the drain when it shortly disappeared under the planking, and all the winning calls he could send forth would not induce it to reappear. He determined to follow it, and was soon close at its quarters; but as he crawled in, the kitten crawled further, and thus they went on until both became so bogged in the deep mud that they could not return. Realizing his position he cried loud and piteously. Those passing the street were mystified by cries coming from the ground; but they could not tell from which part they came. At length a few planks were removed from the drain, and the top of the boy's head was seen protruding from the mud, and the kitten lying dead a short distance off. When taken out he was completely exhausted, and for a time lay in a very critical condition.

The Eastern Question.

A Great Triumph for England

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

LONDON, June 5.

The German Ambassador this afternoon received a dispatch from the Crown Princess of Germany as follows: "I have just seen the Emperor. He has no fever and no pain. His left arm is greatly swollen. His other wounds are healing."

News from Constantinople continue reassuring. The Porte has accepted an invitation to attend the Congress.

Safvet Pasha's new dignity will permit him to meet other Plenipotentiaries on a equal footing.

Sodonlat Bey, Ambassador to Berlin, will probably be the second representative.

In consequence of Mr. Layard's representations, the order for banishing the editor of the "Levant Herald" has been revoked.

BERLIN, June 5.

An official bulletin from the palace, dated 4.30 o'clock, says the favorable symptoms continue, and the Emperor's appetite is somewhat improved.

A dispatch from London to the Berlin Post reports that on Saturday last London detectives informed the British Government that there was great agitation among the Socialists, and that important events were imminent.

LONDON, June 5.

The Times editorial says: "Seldom has a more honorable triumph been won by diplomacy, or rather statesmanship, by any country than that which—as recorded in the invitation to the Congress—has been definitely achieved by England."
