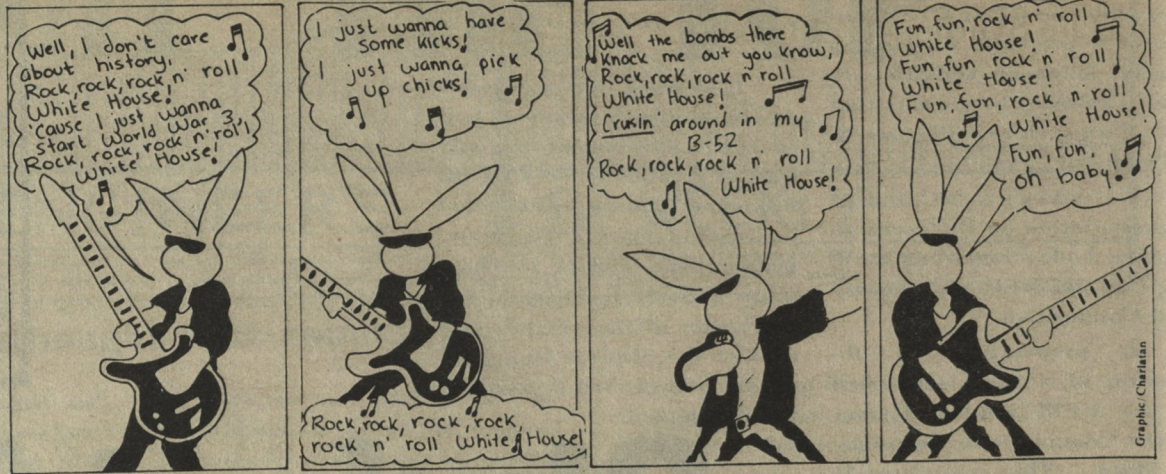
So don't just sit around and expect the other guy to donate. Get out there and give.

When: From noon Friday, February 5 to noon Saturday, February 6.

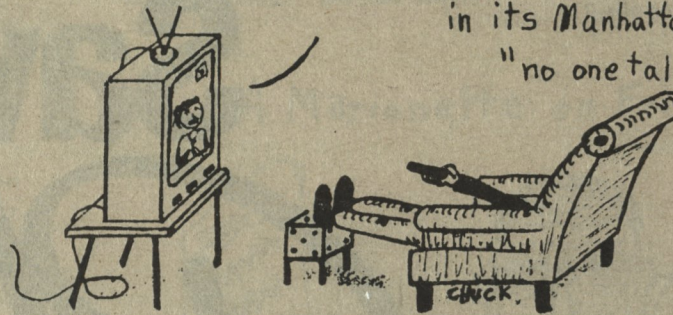
Where: Steele Recital Hall, which is above the cafeteria.
