SUNDAY TRAINS.—Next summer, commencing June 29th, there are to be Sunday express trains between St. John and Boston. This is not the train usually known as the "Flying Yankee."

COUNTY COURT.—The March term of the County Court opens in Charlottetown to-morrow. The business of the term consists of 262 new suits and 12 remanets. About 130 suits stand for trial.

SCOTT ACT.—A Scott Act summons, third offence, returnable on Friday next, was served on Saturday. This with two adjourned cases, makes three cases of Prosecutor Henderson's that are set down for trial on Friday.

NOT TRUE.—A report that Lizzie Stewart, the missing witness in the Weeks-Sutherland poisoning case, crossed over to Cape Tormentine yesterday afternoon, dressed in men's attire, was in circulation about town to-day. We have ascertained that there is no truth in the report; that no boat arrived at Cape Tormentine yesterday evening.

ADDITIONAL ASSESSMENTS.—In accordance with instructions from the City Council, the assessors made returns to the City Clerk to-day of the additional assessments on real estate, personal property and polls for the current year. The additional amount on real estate is \$61,200; on personal property, \$13,600; on polls, \$500. It is said that \$57,000 of the addition on real estate is on new buildings erected during the year.

POLICE COURT.—Wm. Latzer, violating Canada Temperance Act, third offence, two months imprisonment; Daniel Edmunds, violating Canada Temperance Act, second offence, \$100 or two months imprisonment. In both the foregoing cases the information was laid by the police. John Ring, drunk, \$30 or 30 days. Two young men for being drunk on Sunday were fined \$5 or 20 days; and a simple drunk was disposed of for \$2 or 8 days. A larceny case was dismissed.

BAD FOR THE RECORD BREAKERS.—A Montreal despatch says that the Canadian Pacific repudiates any connection with the enterprise of George Francis Train and the other round-the-world racers who propose making use of its line in breaking the record. If they travel by the Canadian Pacific they will do so as ordinary passengers. When the new steamships of the company take their place on the Pacific next year anybody will be able to beat the record by a week or more in the ordinary course of travel.

"OLD BANK" MONEY.—On Friday night last a countryman entered the grocery store of Mr. Thomas Fleigher, corner of Pleasant Street and St. Peter's Road, and purchased a pound of tobacco tendering in payment therefor a \$10 note. The man was given the tobacco and the change for the note, and departed. About an hour afterwards, when Mr. Fleigher was looking over his receipts, he discovered that the \$10 note he had taken in was an "Old Bank" bill! The countryman who "passed" it has not yet been found.

IN THE ICE.—A team broke through the ice near the landing at the foot of Great George Street, early yesterday afternoon, and the occupants of the sleigh—Mr. and Mrs. Osborne, of West River—were pretty well drenched before they were rescued. Mrs. Osborne was very much exhausted when rescued, and had to be taken to a house in the neighborhood, where medical assistance was called in. This afternoon another team broke through in the same place, and was rescued with difficulty. The City Surveyor should see that this dangerous place is fenced in at once. If this is not done we shall likely soon have a drowning accident to chronicle.

STRONG LANGUAGE.—The Winnipeg Item says: Rev. Alex Grant, pastor of the Baptist church, used strong language in reference to the non-inverted membership in the churches last night. He said he could give instances in the city where ministers solicited people to become members of their churches without exacting from them any evidence that they were children of God, or that they had been born again. Ministers who did that were not ministers of heaven but ministers of hell. Referring to the work of the churches, he reversed the order and said he would not be surprised to find at the judgement, when all is revealed, that the churches had been instrumental in sending more people to hell than to heaven.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Changes Suggested.

St. John, N. B., March 23. The council of the Board of Trade met on Saturday and passed a resolution to the effect that it was objectionable to increase the duty on flour; but should it be so decided to increase the duty, it would be only fair to the people of the Maritime Provinces that they be relieved of the duty on other articles used here, and would recommend that molasses imported from the place of growth be admitted free, the duty from other than the place of growth remain, and that corn should also be admitted free, in which case the duty on corn meal should be reduced to twenty cents a barrel. The resolution was forwarded to Ottawa by telegraph.

A Fast Steamer.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 23. A fast steamer is being fitted out here for seal poaching in Behring Sea by a company of local eastern capitalists. It is stated that there is not a suitable vessel on the coast that can make more than 10 knots, and consequently anything faster will practically be secure from capture.

Destructive Cyclone.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., March 23. A destructive cyclone passed over the village of Elgemore, South Carolina, on Saturday afternoon. Fourteen houses were blown down, a negro killed, and several persons seriously injured. The roof of the Georgia, Carolina and Northern depot was blown half a mile away.

The Parnell Forgeries.

LONDON, March 23. It is expected that Gladstone will appear in the Commons for a day to discuss the Parnell forgery motion. In the event of a refusal the Parnellites will raise the question during the discussion of the estimates.

Taxation of Church Property.

WINNIPEG, March 23. The bill relating to the taxation of Church property passed its third reading in the Legislature yesterday. Church buildings and colleges affiliated with Manitoba University are alone exempted.

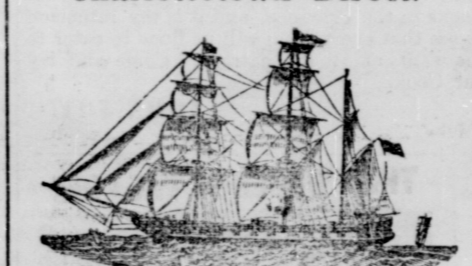
