Egg and Poultry Market Report

The production of eggs continues to decrease, reports Mr. F.M. Nash, District Inspector, Poultry Products. Receipts are lower with no pullet eggs arriving to offset loss in adult production. Quality of product is only fair. Pullet eggs are arriving on the Maritime market, but not in sufficient volume to meet consumer demand, with the result demand continues strong especially on Grade A Large size eggs.

Prices have advanced and producers are now receiving for ungraded eggs delivered: AL 48, AM 46, B 24, C 17. Dealers quoting for graded pack delivered: AL 57, AM 55, B 31, C 22, and wholesaling to retailers at AL 60, AM 58, B 34, C 25 (3c above in cartons). Eggs retailing to consumers AL 65-9, AM 63-7, B 45.

Poultry products are light. One dealer now quoting prices on fowl, live, under 5 lbs., 17-8; 4-5 lbs., 14, under 4 lbs., 14. Dressed fowl, over 5 lbs., A, 24; B, 21; 4-5 lbs., A, 23; B, 20.

No Move To Settle U. S. Steel Strike

By WILLIAM G. SMOCK PITTSBURGH, July 16—(AP)—No one lifted a finger today to end the steel strike, and reports of a secret settlement were scoffed at by union aides.

Labor and industry have no plans for new bargaining sessions. The White House has not made a move to get them together again. A New York state chain of newspapers published a story which said the striking United Steelworkers of America (C.I.O.) will accept the industry's last offer and announce the end of the strike at the Democratic national convention in Chicago on Monday.

Union President Philip Murray wasn't available for comment. Union aides called the report "A wild story." Another published report bearing on a settlement said the end of the strike could come this week if top union officials could agree among themselves. The union called that report "a dream."

The walkout, longest and most expensive in U. S. steel history, costs about \$40,000,000 a day in lost wages and lost steel production. The strike began 45 days ago.
