Steep Rock Iron Ore Is Seen Fascinating Puzzle

 To geologists the existence of the Steep Rock iron-ore range near Atikokan in northwestern Ontario is a fascinating geological puzzle.
 The range is only about 100 miles north of the famous Mesabi range in the United States, but its origins, apparently are different from it and those of Labrador-Ungava, which though much further away from the Mesabi, are apparently similar in origin. Geologists among the delegates of the Commonwealth Mining and Metallurgical Congress a tired question after question concerning Steep Rock's origin during their visit to it.
DESCRIBE ORIGIN
 Geologists of Steep Rock Iron Mines, Ltd., didn't wish to be dogmatic in their replies but the subject may be set out thus in lay language: The ordinary origin of iron ore in North America or would not be in sufficient volume to justify the cost of mining it.

IF THIS HAD BEEN THE ORIGIN OF Steep Rock it could be expected that its formations would be much shallower than they are, instead of extending to depth.
 In fact, in line with the sedimentary theory, for some time it was considered that Steep Rock or would not be in sufficient volume to justify the cost of mining it.
MAY BE SEDIMENT
 The sedimentary theory is not entirely discarded in the case of argument would run something like this.
