TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Parnell Moves an Amendment.

LONDON, Aug. 25.

In the House of Commons, Parnell resumed the debate and moved an amendment to the Address in reply to the Queen's Speech. He predicted that the Government would not last for a year, and charged them with having incited the disorders prevalent in Belfast. He also said that there would be many evictions, the greatest distress, and the most severe coercion existing this winter. Gladstone subsequently spoke on the amendment. The Government decided to oppose Parnell's amendment, and a test vote will be taken on it. The debate is still proceeding.

The Baptist Convention.

St. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 25.

The Baptist Convention yesterday received a delegation from the Free Baptist Conference and treated them very cordially. A committee was appointed to co-operate with the Free Baptists' committee to consider the advisability and practicability of a union of the two bodies. The Convention will meet in Charlottetown, P. E. I., next year.

Fearful Work of the Waves.

MANDALAY, Buthan, Aug. 25.

An embankment of the Niawaddy River burst upon part of the city of Mandalay which became submerged by water. One thousand people were drowned and fifty thousand rendered homeless. The greatest suffering prevails in consequence. The loss will amount to \$5,000,000.

Commendable Enterprise.

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.

It is reported that the Allan Line will buy the Arizona, City of Rome, and other ocean greyhounds.

Wanderers' Again Victorious.

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.

In the cricket match yesterday the Wanderers of Halifax defeated the Ottawa's by one innings and 49 runs.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, Aug. 21.

POTATOES—There has been a fair trade in Potatoes, with sales principally at \$2 per bbl. Car stock is beginning to come in, with sales of Rose and Hebrons at 60 to 70c. Best Sweet Potatoes command \$4 to \$4.50 per bbl.

EGGS—There is no improvement in the Egg market. Demand continues light and prices are weak. Eastern extras command 17c per dozen, because there are not many offering, but firsts are not easy to sell at over 15c, and 15c is an extreme price for best Provincial stock. Canadian are slow at 14 to 13c, and Western can be bought at 13 to 13c. All kinds shrink heavily. Ice-house stock not wanted.

FISH.—Mackerel continues in very light receipt, total landing by the fleet last week at all ports being only 1,441 bbls against 14,804 bbls for the corresponding week last year and the catch to date is only 35,000 bbls, 150,000 bbls less than a year ago. Last advices from the Bay fleet are unfavorable and there is no prospect of anything like an average catch this season. No fare sales the past week. Inspected lots at out-ports are held at \$5.50 for No 3; \$6.50 to \$7 for No 2; and \$12 to \$15 for No 1. No 2 of 1885 catch are held at \$6 to \$7 and No 3 at \$5.50 to \$6. Last sales of P. E. Island were at \$5.50 to \$6 per bbl, but higher rates are expected for new arrivals. Market closes unsettled, with an upward tendency, as buyers are beginning to realize the situation. Codfish are in liberal supply and while quotations are the same, concessions have to be made to sell round lots.

Havoc Among Fishermen.

A despatch from St. John's, Nfld., of the 19th inst., says: Accounts of the destruction caused by the recent gale are fast flowing in. St. Pierre cables that a most violent storm swept over the island on the night of the 18th. It was the fiercest known for a quarter of a century. Buildings were blown down in every direction and considerable damage was done to the shipping in the roads. Two vessels were driven ashore and completely wrecked and several men were badly hurt. Dog Island is strewn with wrecks of fishing vessels and grave fears are entertained for the safety of the Grand Banks fleet. At Black Island a fishing skiff was driven on the rocks and all hands perished. Five Trespasser's skills are missing and are in all probability, lost with all hands, as they drove off to sea in the gale and could not possibly have survived its destructive fury. At Bird Island Cove havoc was caused by the storm and tumultuous sea. Five fishing vessels were there. Fishing stages were wrecked and blown into the sea. At Old Pelican a fishing vessel was swamped and all hands perished. Two crafts were cast ashore at Lead Cove; one man was drowned and several seriously injured. At Baculieu, where a large number of vessels were fishing, it is feared the loss of life and property is great. The Banker, J. K. Mundel, was driven ashore at Bay of Biscay strand and wrecked. The ship's side was broken in and such was the fury of the sea that the crew with difficulty clung to the bottom of the wreck all night, being surf-washed till 9 o'clock next morning, when the sea somewhat abating a line was floated to the ship-wrecked fishermen and one by one they were hauled ashore. It is feared that the fishing fleets on the Labrador coast have suffered heavily.

Preparations are being made for an international exhibition of the various implements used in warfare, to be held in Brussels next year. The promoters of the scheme consider that Brussels offers exceptional facilities for an exhibition of this nature, owing to the neutral position of Belgium.
