

# St. Mary's Down League Leaders 6-2 In Rough Game On Halifax Ice

HALIFAX, Jan. 20 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's, taking advantage of every scoring opportunity, defeated Saint John Beavers 6-2 here Saturday in a roughly-played Maritime Major Hockey League game.

Winger Danny Nixon and goalie Jimmy Strachan were the chief contributors to the Halifax victory, which didn't change their position in the standings. They are in fourth place, two points behind Gloucester Bay Miners.

Beavers playing with juggled lines, kept Halifax off balance and outplayed them most of the game. At times, it was only Strachan's sparkling work that kept Beavers at bay. Nixon fired three goals, one in the first and two in the second period to keep the Saints in the lead.

## Good Attendance At Afternoon Chicago Game

CHICAGO, Jan. 20 — (CP) — Chicago Black Hawks' first experiment with Sunday afternoon hockey today was a success in all but the artistic sense for while they attracted 13,614 fans, they lost a 3-1 decision to Toronto Maple Leafs.

The crowd was the Hawks' largest of a National Hockey League season in which their attendance has slumped about 20 per cent. President Bill Tobin announced that five more Sunday afternoon games will be played. Children under 16 were admitted for half price.

All of the action was crammed into the first two periods. That's when the scoring occurred, as well as the 14 penalties assessed by referee Frank Udvardi.

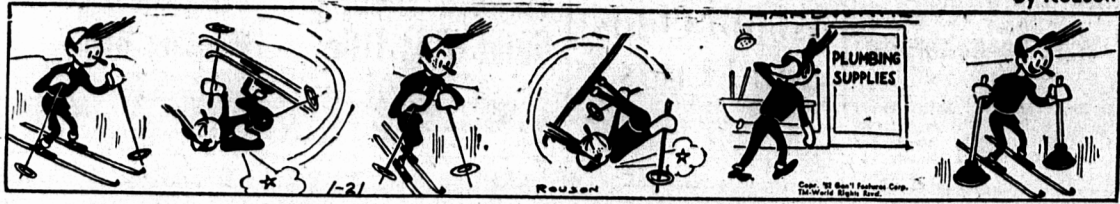

Earl "Skippy" Frezell, the oft-injured Gloucester Bay Miners and Sydney Millionaires left winger, played his first game with the Islanders Saturday night and according to coach Leo Lamoureux he turned in a fairly good performance. Before going into action Saturday, the left winger who has been signed on a try-out basis, had not been playing for a week. "He skated well throughout, broke away once only to stumble in his over-anxiousness to score," reported the coach. Frezell, who scored 27 goals and assisted on 35 more with Gloucester Bay last year, should help the Islanders if he hits his playing stride. A left winger with 35 assists in the Cape Breton loop last season, should work well with "Buck" Whitlock.

Frezell's appearance, however did not change the outcome of the Islanders game in Cape Breton. So far this season both Cape Breton teams have enjoyed a decided edge over the Islanders especially in Sydney and Gloucester Bay where they have proved to be almost invincible. Six times the Millionaires have entertained the Islanders and five times they have been victorious. In six tries at Gloucester Bay the Islanders have salvaged a win and a draw.

On Charlottetown ice the Islanders have had a superiority over the Millionaires but have bowed to the Miners. In four games with the Millionaires the Islanders skated off with a victory on three occasions. On the other hand the Miners have been here five times and left the next morning with three victories. The over-all score for the season between the Islanders and the Miners gives Gloucester Bay seven wins the Islanders three and one game a draw. Against the Mills it has been six Sydney wins and four Charlottetown victories.

"Ray Frederick was a standout for us in both games," reported coach Lamoureux. "In the game Saturday night he blocked several breakaways as the Miners shook loose on our pressure attack. During that game Frederick was called upon 44 times to block Gloucester Bay shots. A peculiar feature of the game was that the both teams played on even terms for the first period with the Miners taking over in the second and third stanzas despite the fact that they had just played five games in six nights."

In spite of their adversities on Cape Breton ice the Islanders have remained in second place ahead of both the Miners and the Millionaires. For this the Islanders can thank the Moncton Hawks and the Halifax Saints. The day is now past, however, when the Saints were considered a sure two points and in the future the Islanders will have to earn their way against Halifax. Against the Saint John Beavers the Islanders have come out about even with the Beavers possibly enjoying one more win.

At present the Beavers and the Moncton Hawks are in their worst slumps of the season. The league leading Beavers, who were once considered to be in a class by themselves, have not won a game since January 6th and this is 16 days ago. In their last six games the Saint John Entry has lost five games and tied one and only the hot and cold play of the Islanders has resulted in the Beavers retaining a 12 point lead over the second place team. Since Phil Hughes left the Beavers on Dec. 30 they have won only two games.

This week, like every week from now on, is an important one for Islanders. A poor week and the Islanders could find themselves in fourth place. A good week and they hold on second place will be strengthened. They play the Millionaires here Tuesday night and the Miners here on Thursday in must games. On Wednesday night they play Saint John and on Saturday night they play the Saints in Halifax in another "must" game.

We extend our congratulations to the Frank Hansen rink which won the Charlottetown Curling Club Championship on Saturday afternoon. For the Hansen rink it was an uphill battle all the way but the fact that they could come from behind showed that they are the stuff of which champions are made. The other members of the Hansen rink are Dr. J. C. Gallant, mate, C. Kidd, 2d. Stone and "Art" MacInnis, lead.

Had Hughes, colorful and effective defenseman of the City League Anchors will leave this morning for Winnipeg, Manitoba where he will work with his uncle in a trucking business. Art's departure will leave a big hole in Paul Williams' defense corps and it is expected that this place will be taken by big Merle Longaphie. Longaphie, a master of the poke check, may play tonight when the Anchors meet the Saints at the Forum.

## Missing Mounties Turn Up Safe

OTTAWA, Jan. 20 — (CP) — Two R.C.M.P. constables, missing and held for 10 days while on a northern patrol, have turned up safely at their sub-Arctic destination, R.C.M.P. headquarters reported today.

The two Mounties were Constable Charles E. Boone, 27, of Newcastle, N.S., and Special Constable Norman Ford, 46, part Eskimo from Labrador. They left Chesterfield Inlet on the northwestern shores of Hudson Bay in the Northwest Territories Jan. 4, travelling eastward by dog team over a 160-mile trail to the R.C.M.P. post at Baker Lake. The area is about 1,000 miles north of Winnipeg.

R.C.M.P. officials became worried when the constables failed to show up at their destination which usually can be reached in about four or five days mushing from the coast base.
