**CHAIRMAN ISSUES APPEAL**

**349 Donors Registered For Red Cross Clinic**

Three hundred and forty-nine donors registered at yesterday's morning and evening sessions of the Red Cross blood donor clinic at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown to exceed the objective for the first three days by a slight margin. The fact that two extra beds were put into operation during the morning clinic speeded up the proceedings and shortened the waiting period for the record number of donors.

A Fremont Archer, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for Charlottetown last night issued an urgent appeal to the residents of Charlottetown and the surrounding area to keep up the record established at yesterday's clinics for the final sessions of this series to take place today at the Confederation Centre between 2-4 this afternoon, and between 7-9 in the evening.

**Former S'side Resident Is Battling In Viet Nam**

SUMMERSIDE — "Go West Young Man," or "California Here I Come" would very probably have been the theme of young John Laurier Poirier, when he left his native Island about three years ago.

But three years later, John is nowhere near sunny California, as the consequences of a democracy meant that he had to fight in Viet Nam to uphold the ideals of that democracy.

Who would think that this young leader — now 22 — would be in Viet Nam three short years after assisting the young fellows in Summerside in their hockey wars?

Today, however, he is one of a few "Islanders" who are trading the "good life" for whizzing sniper's bullets, and a comfortable bed for a mud-hole.

SANTA ANNA John travelled the breadth of North America in the fall of 1964 and for less than a year he made his home in Santa Anna, California, where he was employed by St. Joseph's Hospital Pharmacy.

In August, 1965 Poirier got his call and was drafted, and in March of this year he hit the front lines in Viet Nam, as a member of the Marine Corps.

John signed up with the corps for a four-year period, and his activity in the sports field helped him go through the rigorous eight-week training with no major hitches at the recruit depot in San Diego.

This was the same John who became a name in Summerside sport circles through his involvement in softball, baseball, hockey, and track and field.

In his mother's home on Ottawa Street are lined a number of track trophies, first in the 1963 Lobster Carnival Men's Open 220, member of the winning relay team, 1963 high point scorer.

**Anniversary At Alberton**

ALBERTON — A service commemorating the opening and dedication of the present West Point Presbyterian Church in late September 1880 was held here on Sunday evening, Sept. 25, 1966.

Prior to the erection of this sanctuary 86 years ago, a faithful witness for the Presbyterian cause had been carried on by the early settlers who had come to this new land from the different shires in Scotland, and who had brought with them the priceless possession of their faith, and to whom the act of worshipping the God of their fathers was a veritable necessity.

The service on Sunday evening was conducted by A.R. Murray, catechist in charge of the Alberton — West Point Presbyterian Church. The old and new testament lessons, Isaiah 52 and Matthew 28, were read by Rev. Ian Glass, B.A., B.D., who also delivered a message stressing that the primary purpose of the church in this day, as in the days of yore, is still found in the words of the great commission "Go And Teach".

Mrs. Leslie MacLean was guest organist and members of the O'Leary Baptist Choir led in the service of praise and were heard in several special selections.

A duet by Mrs. Melvin Harris and Lewis Harris, a selection by men's choir and one by the mixed choir, with Mrs. Ross Strang as accompanist.

A duet by James Macdonald and his daughter was also much enjoyed.

Present at the service and still an active member of the congregation was Mrs. John Tierhily, who, as Elizabeth Macdonald had been the first baby baptised after the dedication of the church in 1880.
