A CANADIAN HISTORY.—"A Canadian who is proud of his country, who has faith in its future, and who is sufficiently generous at heart to contribute materially to its educational needs," but whose name has not been given, has offered three prizes amounting to \$2,500 for the best text books on Canadian history. The offer is announced through the committee of the Quebec Protestant Teachers' Convention. The object, says the committee, is to have a text-book of Canadian history which will give every province such recognition as shall unite the interests of all Canadians, and conduce toward the creation of a genuine patriotic sentiment, the aim being to have the text-book authorized for use throughout the Dominion.

IN A FOOL'S PARADISE.—Dr. Parker, the well-known pastor of the City Temple, London, is making a crusade against old methods of worship and exhortation. In his sermon, or rather address, on Sunday, he declared that preaching was no longer an effective instrument of the Gospel. The preachers, he asserted, were living in a fool's paradise. "They are drifting in theology instead of dealing directly with the daily life of the people. Dr. Parker recently invited correspondence from all classes of people, for the purpose of learning what the public thought of the efficacy of pulpit ministrations. His remarks on Sunday were inspired by the result of the enquiry.

Accordingly, an unwilling victim was secured, his hands and feet tied, a black cap put on, and his neck made fast in a noose of the bell rope. The deputy criminal was forthwith swung off his feet, and there would have been a very tragic tale to tell, had not one of the aiders and abettors of the hanging come to his right mind and cut the rope in the nick of time.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A SEVERE STORM.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.

The storm which came down upon New York city yesterday morning about 10.30 proved to be one of unusual severity. From that hour until two to-day the wind blew a gale, and with it were a heavy rainfall and an extraordinary high tide. Streets in the lower part of the city were flooded. Along the New Jersey coast wires are reported down and several vessels are ashore. Others were driven from their course. Very high tides prevailed on the Long Island coast. Along the Sound ports water went high up to the villages, flooding cellars and carrying vessels hundreds of feet on shore. The wind blew a hurricane last night.

COHASSET, Mass., Oct. 24.

The storm which raged on the south shore to-day was the most violent one since the memorable storm of Nov. 1888. It rained hard all day, the wind blowing a gale from the east and is now constantly increasing in violence. No serious damage reported, and no wrecks have been found.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 24.

The imports for September were \$10,700,000, a decrease as compared with September, 1889. The exports were \$12,500,000, of which \$11,225,000 was produce of Canada, an increase of \$2,500,000 over September, 1889.

Among the applications for incorporation is one for a new cotton mill company at Montreal, with a capital of a hundred thousand dollars. Gault, Grenier, Morrice and others are interested.

Mrs. Birchall has written the Deputy Minister of Justice expressing anxiety regarding the return of the Governor-General in time to consider her husband's case. She has been assured that the case shall be fully considered.

The LaMontagne Case

QUEBEC, Oct. 24.

The LaMontagne murder case promises to result in international complications. Lemieux, counsel for Leda LaMontagne, says that the young woman having been extradited for arson, the crown had no right to insist upon her giving evidence at her brother's trial for murder, and that her commitment for contempt of court for refusing to testify was a breach of faith, on the part of Canada towards the United States. Mr. Lennox intends applying to the Minister of Justice to release Leda LaMontagne and if he refuses will report to the Secretary of State at Washington asking that the United States take action to compel Canada to release the prisoner.

The Comte de Paris.

MONTREAL, Oct. 24.

Comte de Paris and suite arrived this morning, and was received at Bonaventure Depot by 20,000 people, including 600 students from the three universities. The Comte will not talk politics, but thinks Canada one of the greatest and freest countries in the world.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Oct. 24.

The miners of the Lithgow collieries are to resume work on Monday. Their action is regarded as the death-blow to the extensive strikes throughout Australia.

Hamlin's team, Belle Hamlin and Justina, sent to-day to beat 2.15, the world's record held by them, made it in 2.13.

St. John Crew Wins.

HALIFAX, Oct. 24.

The boat race between the crews from St. John and Halifax was rowed to-day on Bedford Basin. The St. John crew won by three lengths in 18 min. 43 seconds.
