North Rustico Man Is Fined For Damaging Legion Home

Pleading guilty to two charges, Joseph Pineau, North Rustico, was fined \$30 and costs or 30 days in jail on each offence, by Acting Magistrate Charles B. McQuaid in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday afternoon.

Pineau, on the first count was charged with creating a disturbance in a public place, the North Rustico Legion Home, by shouting and swearing.

On the second he was charged with damaging private property, by smashing the door to the Legion Home. On this count the magistrate also assessed damages against the accused at \$40.

Pineau pleaded not guilty to driving while intoxicated, but guilty to the lesser count of driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, Patrick Sinnott, Bristol, Ltd. 40, was fined \$150 and costs or 10 days.

The increased penalty was handed out after the arresting officer disclosed that the half-ton truck which the accused was driving was involved in a three-vehicle collision in Mount Stewart.

Hollis Dewar, Jay, Sheewood, and Louis MacLeod, Belle, Belle River, both charged with having the care and control of motor vehicles while intoxicated, were both given remands with bail to stand.

Jay, who is counselled by John J. Holmes, was remanded until April 24, and Blue until April 26.

Three accused pleaded guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences and each was fined \$30 and costs or 30 days.

Harold Smith, North River, and Lloyd Greene, North River, both charged with driving a motor vehicle on the highway without due care and attention were each fined \$10 and costs.

Four men charged with operating a non-registered vehicle on a public highway were each fined five dollars and costs.

Construction Lapsing Reduces Jobless Total

More than 700 people have ceased drawing unemployment insurance benefit since April 11, in Kings and Queens counties, George W. Cheverie, manager of the national employment office in Charlottetown said yesterday.

This reduction in the number of benefit claimants is partly due to persons exhausting their benefit, Mr. Cheverie said, but a large number have been placed in employment, as the construction program in the Charlottetown area gains momentum with better weather and working conditions.

J. A. Murphy, employment branch supervisor estimated the number of persons now employed in major construction projects in the Charlottetown area to be 345 at the present time.

As older projects, such as the Canadian Legion home, St. Dunstan's University library and the golf club house and curling rink near completion, new construction starts are being made or planned for this summer, Mr. Murphy said, so that any disruption of the construction work force is expected.

EARLY START
Owners of fish filleting plants in Souris are preparing for an early start on processing fish from dragners, while dragger captains and crews are busy reading boats and gear in the hope that ice conditions will allow sailing for the fishing grounds Monday.

Lobster fishermen and packers are working against serious shore road conditions, which hamper the movement of traps and gear to small harbours, in the hope that they can be ready for the May 1 opening of the lobster season.

With the return to work of fishermen and cannery and packing plant crews, the number of unemployed in the two counties should be reduced to approximately one-third of the present number, Mr. Cheverie said.

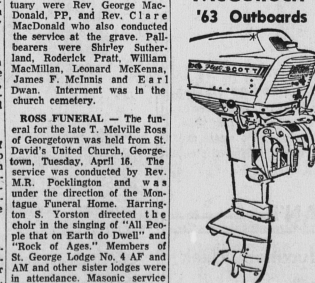
Donald MacLaren, Charlottetown, charged with speeding, was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

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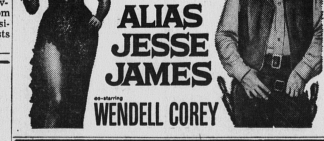
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
