Souris Council In Special Meet

St. John's TV Outlet Sees Threat From CBC

OTTAWA (CP)—Don Jamieson, vice-president of the privately-owned St. John's television station CJON-TV, claimed Friday that his station will be placed in an impossible position if the publicly-owned CBC is permitted to establish a new television station in the Newfoundland capital.

"I express the unqualified conviction that the Newfoundland market cannot support two competing stations at this time," he said at a public hearing of the Board of Broadcast Governors.

CBC President J. Alphonse Ombert replied that the CBC is not seeking to put St. John's affiliate station out of business, although he conceded the CBC's presence will have some adverse effect on CJON revenues.

He said the advantages gained by establishing a CBC-owned station together with the co-acting director of the trade union service provided by CJON-TV outweighed any temporary economic loss to the private station.

The CBC's application was a bid to further national unity, Mr. Ombert said. There was a public need to establish a publicly-owned national voice in the capital city of Newfoundland and to provide the province with a voice in the national television service.

Program For Apprentices Inaugurated At Voc. School

Under a new apprenticeship program inaugurated this year at the Charlottetown Vocational School, students in the designated trades of bricklaying, carpentry, plumbing, electrical, mechanics and hairdressing can, for the first time, attain journeyman or full fledged status in their chosen trade.

The beginning of this program is known as pre-apprenticeship training, whereby students spend one year at the vocational school in training, and then are inducted into an employer as an apprentice.

Each year, at the conference of the employer and the Vocational School, the students return to the school for a six-week course and then return to the employer after passing examinations.

Following this, and depending on the student's ability, he is required to serve approximately two years with his employer, taking a six-week course at the school each year.

At the end of the final course, the student is examined by his journeyman's certificate, and is a full fledged electrician, plumber or carpenter as the case may be.

FIRST CLASS

The first class in this new program is now completing the initial six weeks course in apprenticeship training. Bernard Clinton, Souris, and Vernon Pineau, Fernwood, two carpentry students are expected to finish the course next week. They will then return to their employers, Chandler Bow, custom woodworkers, until it is time for the next course.

Their final project was the construction of a wall including windows, doors, eave finish, putty, roof flashing on the chimneys and shingles.

From time to time during the year students in other trades will come in for their first course under the new program.

Until this course came into effect there was no way for a student here to receive a journeyman's certificate in his trade, it was noted.

Liberals Not To Seek Court Action

The P.E.I. Liberal Party executive decided yesterday against the idea of petitioning the supreme court under a section of the Controverted Election Act on the ground of alleged irregularities in the election of an Assemblyman in Three Queens on December 10 last, it was learned Thursday from W.R. Jenkins, federation president.

The petition being entered it would have been to have the court set aside the result of the election in which Andrew B. MacRae, Progressive Conservative, East Royalty was the winner over Cecil Miller, Liberal of Freehold.

Had the petition been allowed to proceed it would have held in the Three Queens riding for the election of an Assemblyman candidate.

Senator O'Leary Has Warm Praise For Diefenbaker

OTTAWA (CP) — In a rousing tribute to his party leader, Senator M. Grattan O'Leary hailed Prime Minister Diefenbaker Friday as the man who rescued Canada from 22 years of "government by crystal balls and mumbo-jumbo."

Senator O'Leary, introducing the prime minister to a general meeting of the Progressive Conservative Association here, said that by his "unforgettable victory" in 1957 Mr. Diefenbaker had rescued the conservative party from 22 years of "defeat and discord."

"Let us not betray ourselves to the madness of taking an estimate of our leader from the lips of those who hate him because they fear him," Senator O'Leary warned the delegates.
