RESULTS OF OPERATION FOR STOMACH ULCER

When a patient with peptic ulcer (ulcer of the stomach and first part of small intestine) has suffered with pain after every meal for a number of years, he is certainly going to welcome any treatment which will give him relief even if this treatment involves surgical operation in which a large portion of his stomach is removed.

Fortunately, during the past few years, medical and diet treatment has given such relief that surgical operations have not been used as much as formerly. However, there are cases in which medical and diet treatment have not been successful and surgical operation has been the last resort.

In Surgery, St. Louis, Dr. R. F. Rauch reports the results obtained in 893 operations removal of part of stomach) over a ten-year period at the University of Minnesota's hospitals. In 732 cases, the removal of three-quarters of the stomach, medical treatment, would show that operation when considered necessary, helps the majority of cases.
