

Severe Storm Hits W. Prince

An extremely severe electrical storm struck the West Prince area last evening accompanied by heavy rain, and hail in some localities. Several electric circuits were temporarily out of order at Alberton and Tignish, reportedly from burned out transformers. The home of Mr. George McBeth at Alberton South was struck about seven thirty and set on fire. Neighbours quickly assembled and extinguished the flames before much damage was done. No one was injured by the lightning bolt, which entered the house under the eave and went out through the roof, but occupants which included Mr. and Mrs. McBeth and Mrs. McLeod, were badly shaken up. The Alberton Fire Dept. were called out but the fire had been put out when they arrived at the scene.

Sister Falls From Car Brother Falls Out Of Bed

Two children in one Alberton family were injured in separate accidents on Sunday. In the afternoon four year old Pauline Whelan fell out of her father's car when the door swung open accidentally, and fractured a collar bone. Later in the evening her five year old brother Walter, fell out of the upper bed of an army type bunk and suffered a long deep cut on the upper part of his forehead which required ten stitches to close. Inquest Is Being Held In Park Corner Fatality

The husband of Mrs. Wade (Catherine) Hall of Chambersburg, Pennsylvania, U.S.A., was expected to arrive at Summerside by plane early this morning to complete funeral arrangements for his wife who was found dead inside her wrecked car at Park Corner, about six miles from Kensington, on Sunday morning. Mrs. Hall, 47 years of age, died as a result of injuries, when the 1955 Ford coach in which she was driving alone, continued across the "T" intersection where the Tristram Road joins the North Shore Highway at Park Corner and ploughed head on into the steep rock-faced incline sloping up from the ditch. The force of the impact totally demolished the front of the car causing multiple injuries to the woman which resulted in her death. The accident occurred only a short distance from the tourist home of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Cousins, in Park Corner where Mrs. Hall together with her two sons John 10, and Wade 12 were spending their summer holidays. The boys were at the tourist home when the crash occurred and Mrs. Hall had been enroute to join them, after having visited friends in Summerside, about 15 miles distant. The R.C.M.P. and coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan of Summerside were called to the scene following the discovery of the accident by Mr. Lorne Campbell of Sea View. A coroner's jury was impaneled and the inquest was adjourned to the call of the coroner. 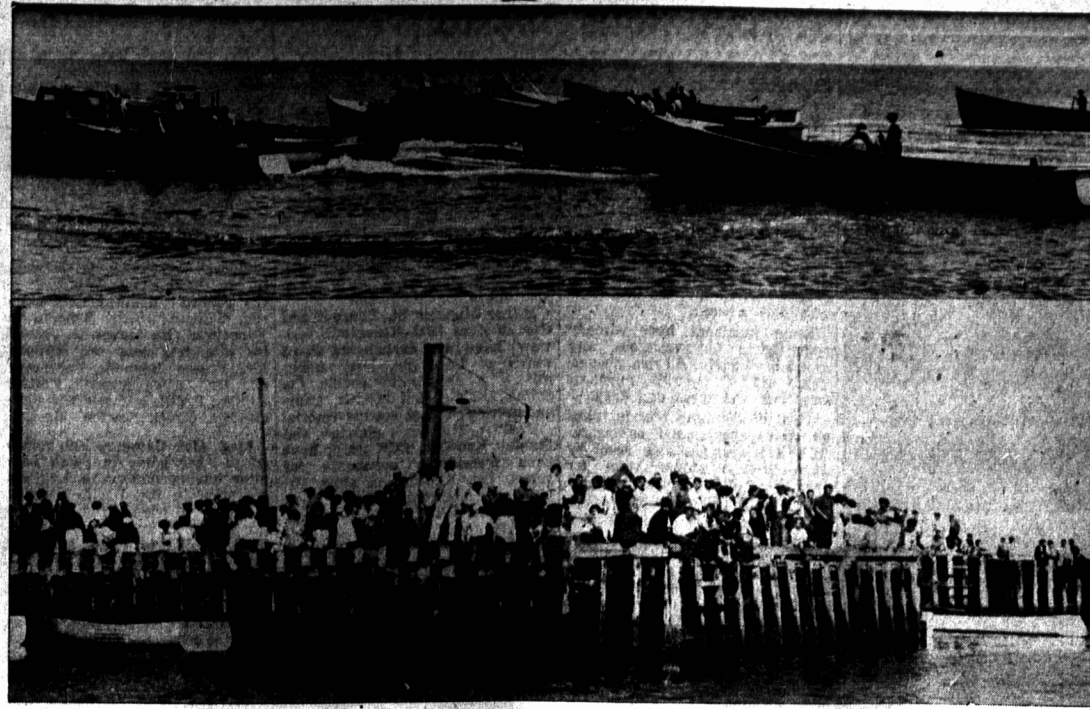

To Open Catholic Social Welfare Bureau In S Side

This week a Social Welfare Bureau will be opened in Summerside by the Sisters of St. Martha and will be located at Summerside West in a property long known as The Priory which was owned by the late Captain Basil Kelly and has been occupied until recently by Mrs. Kelly. An announcement to this effect was made by Rt. Rev. G.J. MacLellan, V.G., pastor at Summerside, who extended a welcome to the sisters and asked the members of the congregation to give them their support in this important work. The Priory was purchased by the Episcopal Corporation as the result of a provision in the will of the late Captain Kelly, who expressed a desire that his home be used for some religious or charitable purpose. The Bureau will be headed by a sister, who has had two years training at a school of social work in addition to her college degree. The work to be carried out will cover all phases of social welfare work and will in general attempt to meet the needs of the people. One of the major tasks of such a bureau comes under the heading of family counselling which includes relief, and endeavours to solve marital difficulties and work with children. An important branch of the work has to do with unmarried mothers and the placement of their children in foster and adoptive homes. Foster homes are homes in which children are placed temporarily and kept until they can be studied and placed in suitable adoptive homes. The sisters will also work with the poor, particularly the sick.
