

Among The Farmers

(Federation of Agriculture News)

Important Meeting

Last Tuesday night saw three important meetings take place in the eastern part of the Province. It has been noticeable that attendance is usually much better at a meeting where potato problems are up for discussion but the meeting of Whole Milk Shippers at Eidon proved that farmers have not centered their minds entirely on the potato. For many dairymen the shipping of whole milk is a venture and it is quite understandable that after years of selling cream there are new problems and new questions arise. The meeting at Eidon was a move in the right direction, everyone may not have left happy but, nevertheless both the producers and the processors had an opportunity of stating both sides of the case. Personally we are convinced that more and more of the dairy production in this province will be sold as whole milk and cream separators will be used less and less.

At Morell, Kings County potato growers had an important decision to make in electing two members to the Potato Board for the next three years, men who had already seen service on the Board were re-elected, an indication that those present were satisfied both with the record of the Board members and with the Board itself.

The Federation meeting at Morell saw an innovation in the program with the appearance of invitation of representatives from two Provincial Government Departments and from the Science Service of the Dominion Department. The National Film Board was present and added much to the meeting with the showing of a film on various methods of harvesting and storing silage.

Coming Meetings

Friday evening at the Summer-side High School the Prince County Federation of Agriculture will stage its Semi-Annual meeting. Prince County farmers have long been active supporters of their organization and can be depended upon to turn out in large numbers and to produce a meeting that is both lively and valuable.

On Tuesday evening, July 6th, at Birch Court Queens County farmers will gather and it may be expected if history repeats itself that there will be at least a few individuals accept the responsibility of gingering the session up. The member who is willing to speak from the floor and present his ideas forcibly can do as much towards making a good meeting as any special speaker.

C.F.A. Meetings

Amherst, N.S. and the Maritimes will be host to representatives of the Canadian Federation from all provinces of Canada towards the latter part of July. On July 22nd the Eastern Agriculture Conference will bring together delegates from the five Eastern provinces.

These delegates will discuss Eastern problems and frame recommendations for the consideration of the C.F.A. general meetings which commence on Monday, July 26th, with meetings of the Hog and Poultry Committees.

Tuesday, July 27th, is a date which Federation members should note, for on that day the general meeting open to the public is staged and provides members with the opportunity of observing the National Organization in action. The conference will conclude on Wednesday and Thursday with board meetings at which the Island will be represented by its Director, Mr. Roland McDonald and by Mr. W. R. Elbow who will be substituting for Mr. Burroughs, the Director from the Canadian Horticultural Council.

Down 25%

A cut in salary or wages is never very palatable and if it amounts to 25% then the earner will likely be forced to make some drastic adjustments in his manner of living. This is exactly what has happened to agriculture during the past two years, the real net farm income in 1953 was 10% lower than in 1952 and 25% lower than in 1951. To put it simply the average Canadian farmer had \$75 to spend in 1953 where he had \$100 in 1951. Of course the farmer has had a world of experience in making adjustments and with some belt tightening manages to get by, but the belt tightening is felt in other quarters and results in lower retail volume and an curtailed manufacturing activity. The loss of 25% may possibly be absorbed by the farmers for a certain period, but if the loss is increased or long continued then the economic wheels in general will soon be squeaking for grease.

Successful Islander

The story of successful Islanders abroad is, of course, an old one and we were interested to learn that one of our exports has risen to a position of prominence in the world organization of farmers. W. J. Ball, president of the Saskatchewan Federation of Agriculture and a native of Prince County was, during the I.F.A.P. Conference in Kenya elected chairman of the Policy Committee, this is a most important position and carries with it great responsibility. The chairman of such a group must have both ability and experience in order to do a satisfactory job and reports indicate that Mr. Ball did exactly that. Prince County has good reason to be proud of the leadership provided in this instance in an international organization.

Farm Credit

The credit policy of financial institutions are, for the most part, designed to fit the needs of industry and commerce and are very likely satisfactory in this respect.

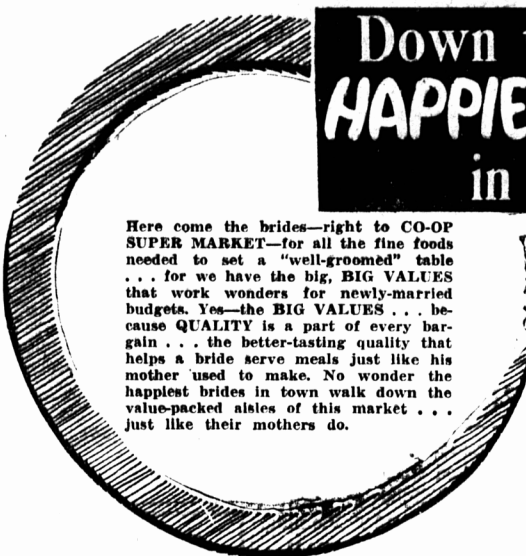
