Themselves must strike the blow,”  
all will be well. Remember the 21st of February, 1867!

**NEW YORK, 8th.**—Stephens indignant at recent action of Centre, and denies deserting the Fenian organization. He refuses to be deposed, and means to fulfil his promises.—Gold 134.

**ST. JOHN, N. B., Jan. 9, p. m.**—London *Times* of the 8th instant says British minister at Washington instructed to ascertain whether United States will submit *Alabama* claims to arbitration, provided certain points were previously agreed on.

**ST. JOHN, Jan. 11, p. m.**—It is now considered that Confederation is a sure and fixed fact. Further reports say that Tilley has been made Baronet with prospect of higher honors. No news by Cable worth reporting.—Gold 132.

**ST. JOHN, Jan. 14.**  
A Toronto despatch says several Fenian prisoners, including Lynch and McMahon, have had their sentences commuted to twenty years imprisonment in the Kingston Penitentiary.

New York *Herald* says that Secretary Seward's application for copies of the papers connected with the Fenian trials, was indignantly rejected.

Particulars of Confederation unknown, but said will give satisfaction to all Parties. Not a word about P. E. Island.

**ROME, Jan 11th.**—Interdict laid upon continuance religious services Scotch Protestant Church this city. They threaten stop service in American Chapel. Gold 131.

There is no such Church in Rome as a Scotch Protestant Church, nor yet an American Chapel, unless a private one connected with the American Embassy. **LONDON, Jan. 8.**  
Rumours again in circulation of changes in British Cabinet.

“Times” editorial to-day, says it rests with the United States Government to accept the principle of arbitration; thinks the Law officers of the two countries should meet, and would frame satisfactory case of arbitration in a few hours.

### BY CABLE.

Northampton, Dec. 26, a. m.  
The yacht “Henrietta” arrived at the Needles off the Cows, at 5.45 last evening; and the “Vesta” at 3.30 this morning. The Board of Admiralty gave orders that every facility should be tendered the yachts by the officers on duty in the English Channel. The members of the Royal Yacht Club extended a magnificent and cordial reception to the crews of American Yachts,—men being invited to visit the Queen at Osborne House.

“Henrietta” won race in 13 days and 2 hours; “Fleeting” lost four men in a gale. Owner of “Henrietta” challenges any yacht in Europe.

Cows, Dec. 28, p. m.  
The Yachting party visited Osborne House, one of the residences of the Queen, this morning and were courteously received by Major General Seymour, who conducted them about the palace and grounds, after which a sumptuous lunch was served for the party. This evening the Commodore of the New York Y. Club, Capt. Bennett, and their yachting friends, will dine with Lord Lennox. His Royal Highness Prince Alfred, who manifests great interest in marine sporting matters, will be present.

New York, Dec. 29.  
The Steamship *Australasian*, which has been Storm bound in the lower bay a couple of days, reached her dock at an early hour this morning. She brings advices to the 16th inst.

The Queen had subscribed £200 for the relief of the sufferers by the colliery explosions. No more Fenian arrests had been made, and the alarm was subsiding.

The United States had brought an action in France against Mr. Arnaud, for the restitution of two million two hundred and eighty thousand francs, which it claims as the price paid by the Confederate agents for ships of war.

The French police had seized a proclamation, said to have emanated from Gen. Prim, calling upon the people of Spain to rise and revolt.

Papal Cabinet agree that the appointment of Bishops shall be made by the Pope, and receiving sanction of Emperor of Italy.

St. John, N. B., Jan. 7, a. m.  
The London “Times” of January 4th urges upon the Government a speedy and amicable adjustment of outstanding difficulties with the United States.

St. John, N. B., Jan. 8, p. m.  
The London despatch of the 7th says Great Britain and France mutually agree not to interfere between Greece and the Sublime Porte unless Russia interferes. Gold 135.

PARIS, 14th Jan.—Rumored, but not confirmed, that a desperate plot to assassinate the Emperor Napoleon has been discovered. Frustrated by officials.

“Bravo,” “Celt,” “Curlew,” “Daybreak,” “Favorite,” “Java,” “Jennet,” “Talba,” “W. W. Lord,” “Mianie-haha,” arrived in Britain.—Gold 135.

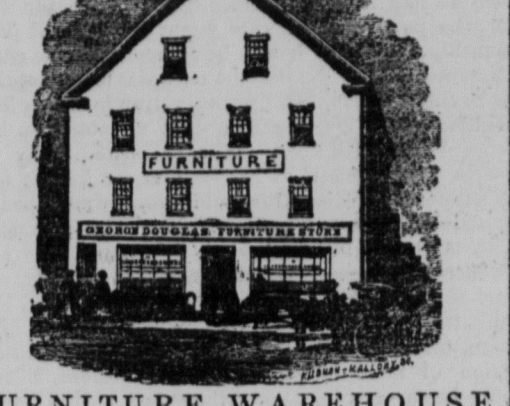
