Weekly Potato Bulletin Report

In an earlier bulletin it was pointed out that the lack of frost in the ground during the winter had permitted the survival of potato tubers in the soil and that disease sporelings among the surviving tubers will serve as potential sources of early infection for certain important diseases of fungus, bacterial and virus origin. It is now known that this advice was well founded, many volunteer potato plants appearing in the grain fields. Farmers who have planted potatoes in land where potatoes were grown in 1951, may, in cases where a different variety is grown this season, be faced with the task of roguing out many foreigners.

More than 60 members were present, most of whom took part in the various discussions, dealing with policy and programme for the activities of the organization during the next year.

Several resolutions were passed including one indicating Mr. Allison Profit as their first choice as judge of Holsteins at the Maritime Winter Fair, with Mr. Jack Fraser of Ontario as second choice. The latter will also be judge at Charlottetown this year.

A resolution was passed leaving the choice of a judge for next year at the Charlottetown Exhibition, to the incoming directors.

The announcement was made that the Graham Breeding School would be in session at Moncton, N. B., for five days from November 4.

A recess was called at noon when the members repaired to the Rendezvous Restaurant where a luncheon was served with an overflow attendance in the upper dining-room. Bill Bears, from Belle River, supplied the music which was warmly applauded.

Chairman Lewis then called upon Mr. S. C. Wright, senior agricultural representative, to present the awards in the unavoidable absence of Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, who sent his regrets.

R. O. P. Awards R.O.P. certificates were handed the winners in nicely framed form, ready for display as a mark of distinction, to the following:

River Belle Shirley, 738887, as a Senior 3-year-old on twice a day milking produced 15,262 lbs. milk test 4.59-700 lbs. fat. Owned by Kimball LeLacheur, Murray Harbour. Mr. LeLacheur was heartily congratulated on his success, particularly in view of the fact that he is a young and new breeder.

A winner for Walter Buntain and son, Rustico, was Seaside Susie Abbecker, 24th 149, 149, lbs. of milk, 5.174 lbs. of fat. Andrew Jardine of Pictouville rated as a double winner with Lynvenith Heather Bell Racharm, 313423, producing 107,121 lbs. of milk, 3,569 lbs. of fat, 8 lactations, and Maplewood Linda Rooker 459803, producing 11,303 lbs. of milk, 3,797 lbs. fat, 8 lactations.

Mr. Lincoln Dewar reported having discussed various aspects of the foot and mouth disease with officials recently at Ottawa and, stated Agriculture Minister Gardiner, had suggested to Ontario livestock breeders that they might be able to sell to Saskatchewan breeders as recipients for the cattle destroyed as a result of the disease.

Mr. Dewar went on to say that four States of the United States have legalized the removal of butterfat and replacement by vegetable oils. "When trends of this kind start in the States they invariably spread to Canada and I am thinking that eventually a production of 100 lbs. of 2 per cent milk per day may become a reality, with butterfat rated as a by-product of little or no commercial value," he said. "With butter fat going to 70 cents a pound and a nutritious substitute at 20 cents, the housewife is looking for an acceptable substitute, regardless of the overtures by the dairy people to consider the value of their contribution to the well-being and prosperity of the Canadian people."

"In Toronto for instance," concluded Mr. Dewar, "whipped cream is a thing of the past, there is absolutely no sale for this commodity, and vegetable oil as a competitor is becoming increasingly active day by day."

In the afternoon, when the session was resumed, Mr. Dewar suggested that the most practical way to encourage and improve breeding was to retain bulls until maturity. The announcement was made that the Association would continue to pay \$50 for each bull qualified. The Government has been paying \$100 over a two-year period which would be continued. The record of graded dam must be submitted before a bull can be registered. The registration of bulls is down 40 per cent this year, according to a statement by Mr. Dewar.
