NO LONG RANGE PLANS

Campbell Noted Change In Attitude Of Gov't

Alex B. Campbell, leader of the opposition, arrived in Charlottetown from Ottawa where the new leader of the provincial Liberals had been conferring with leading members of the national Liberal Party including the Prime Minister and members of federal cabinet.

On his return Mr. Campbell had a number of comments to make both on his visit to the national capital and on events that have taken place on the provincial political scene in his absence.

Commenting on the recently announced pay raises for school teachers and public servants Mr. Campbell said, "If we can claim no other credit, I think the Liberal party was effective in spurring the provincial government." Mr. Campbell was making reference to a press statement he made on Jan. 8 concerning the problem of salaries for those two groups.

Mr. Campbell has noted a change in the attitude of Premier Shaw and his government in their relationship with the federal government. "Previously the provincial government had been very vigorously condemning the federal government for its lack of policies," he said, "now there is a general thaw in relations with Ottawa. I am happy to see the (the premier) is giving due recognition to the federal government."

The Liberal leader likened this change of attitude to a change of horses, "the premier is now riding his election horse," he said.

ARDA PROGRAM

Mr. Campbell said the Liberal opposition will "bring attention to the provincial government's delinquency under the ARDA program to benefit the agricultural segment of the province."

While in Ottawa Mr. Campbell conferred with both the officials of the ARDA program and the Atlantic Development Board.

"We have observed the present government has been in office for six years and has not developed any long range programs for the agriculture or fishing industries of the province; at least not developed to the stage to be able to claim part of the \$50 million ARDA program," said the new Liberal leader.

Mr. Campbell said he felt he should be critical of the Premier's action taken on behalf of the fishermen of District No. Eight. While the Premier has a promised provincial government aid, press reports indicate this aid will consist of two or three airplane tickets for representatives of the fishermen, chaperoned by a cabinet minister, to go to Ottawa to make their plea.

"The Premier can not but be aware that such an approach can not hope to meet with success. In this awareness he should establish an effective lobby and not only employ the support of the four federal representatives of the Island and the two senators, but also every official of the provincial government."

ACTION FALLS SHORT

"The action which he has suggested falls short of a bona fide effort to answer the needs of the fishermen," said Mr. Campbell. "There was no suggestion whatsoever of provincial financial assistance, in the form of loans or subsidies."

While in Ottawa Mr. Campbell explored, at the suggestion of the premier, the possibility of a heavy water industry establishing in the province.

"We have the assurance of Hon. J.W. Pickersgill, minister of transport and Hon. C.M. Drury, minister of industry, that feasibility studies will be conducted."

"I hesitate in getting too excited about this though," said Mr. Campbell, "because of the lack of local energy needed for such an industry."

APPOINTMENT EXPECTED

When asked if there would be an avenue for continued communication between the province and the federal cabinet, Mr. Campbell said he expects, "that within a week John Mulhally, former member for King's, will be named an executive assistant to one of the federal ministers."

Mr. Campbell is also anticipating one of the cabinet ministers will be designated to look out for the interests of Prince Edward Island. He did not think that this appointment would be one that will be made public.

Mr. Campbell met with many of the members of the federal cabinet including, J. Greene, the new minister of agriculture, open mind and receptive to new ideas.

Mr. Campbell who did not arrive back in the province until yesterday afternoon got right back to the business of organizing the provincial Liberal party. Last evening he travelled to Souris for meetings with party members there.

He worked in the maintenance department at the local RCAF station from his discharge from the RCAF in 1946 to his appointment as assistant registrar of deeds for Prince County in 1953. He has been registrar of motor vehicles for Summerside and the vicinity since 1953, and has served on the town council for the past four months.

He is married to the former Olive Murray of St. Eleanor's.

Mrs. Perry was born in Summerside, educated here and in Charlottetown. She served as a Girl Guide leader for 12 years, president of the Catholic Women's League for two terms, and is on the provincial nominating executive of the Girl Guide association and the Catholic Women's League. She is a partner in Capital Realities and the owner of her own business, the Capital Theatre. Her husband, Wilfred Perry of Summerside, is associated with her as manager of the Capital Theatre. Mrs. Perry has five children.

She has served two terms on the town council and is presently chairman of the finance committee.

Opera Carmen To Be Staged Here By Canadian Company

The renowned Canadian Opera Company will visit Charlottetown to present two performances of Georges Bizet's all-time favorite opera Carmen Thursday, February 3, in one of the highlights of Confederation Centre Theatre's winter program.

The classic story of gypsy passion, love, intrigue, and tragedy, will be performed in English with spoken dialogue in an adaptation of the Opera Comique version of the famous story.

Carmen has long been regarded as Bizet's masterpiece, combining an exciting plot with some of the most melodic music in opera. The coveted title role has been sung by the greatest stars of opera; and the music has become perhaps more familiar than that of any other single opera.

Carmen has been included in the repertoire of the Canadian Opera Company during two previous seasons in its 13 year history, and on both occasions rave reviews have been accorded the company wherever the spectacular production has played.

The Charlottetown appearances form part of the Company's sixth national tour under the direction of the General Manager Herman Geiger-Tourtel, who has been associated with the company since its inception.

The Company last visited Charlottetown with their production of Die Fledermaus during the summer of 1964.

Two members of the company will share the lead role in Charlottetown.

In the students' matinee at 2:00 p.m., June Genovese will sing Carmen, while Marija Kova will take the part in the evening performance.

Guy Lavoie will sing Don Jose in the afternoon, while Jean Louis Pellerin will take the role in the second performance, and the other major roles will alternate between members of the company as well.

Tickets are currently on sale at Confederation Centre box office priced from \$1.50 to \$3.50 for the evening performance and a flat 50 cents for the students' matinee.

Unfinished Business

Premier Walter R. Shaw, in commenting on Tuesday's throne speech read by Governor General George Vanier at the opening of the 27th session of Parliament in Ottawa, he said that it dealt with a lot of unfinished business left over from the last sitting of parliament.

The premier said, "I am interested in knowing what is going to come out of the agricultural programs mentioned, especially in the field of rural development."

He mentioned that some of the programs mentioned in the throne speech have been in other throne speeches in the past and there is yet to be anything done about them.

The premier expressed his doubts about the value of the program for the purchase, redevelopment and resale of uneconomic farms. "I am not particularly interested," he said, "in that plan of taking someone off his land with no place to put him."
