JAMES LARMOUR, an old pensioner, and his wife were burned to death at Brocton, a Toronto suburb, on Saturday night last. The man drew his pension that day, and both got drunk, and then set the house on fire.

CUMMINGS, White and McKinnon, three of the party implicated in the North River trouble, to-day, gave bail for their appearance before the Stipendiary Magistrate on Tuesday next, when he will hand them over to the Grand Jury.

J. H. FLETCHER, Esq., late Queen's Printer, intends retiring from the field of journalism; and offers the *Island Argus* and all the plant of his office for sale. The *Argus* has a large circulation, and the outfit of type, etc., is good.

THE examination of James and William Crosby, for stealing sheep from Mr. Alexander McKinley, of the Royalty, took place before Theoph. DesBrisay, Esq., in Queen's County Jail, to-day. We understand there is strong circumstantial evidence against James for stealing the sheep and William for receiving them.

THE schr. *Landseer*, Malady, from Prince Edward Island for Baltimore, with potatoes, left Vineyard Haven, December 19, and when off Fire Island she holed to, but was blown to sea 200 miles and lost all water from off the deck. Friday morning, the 27th, the schr. sent a boat to the *Sow and Pigs* Light vessel, and the captain supplied her with wood and water to last her to Newport.

THE market was fairly attended to-day. Prices were as follow: Beef, small, from 5 to 12 cents; do. by the qr., from 3 1/2 to 7 cents; mutton, from 4 to 8 cents; lamb, from 4 to 8 cents; geese, each, from 40 to 60 cents; ducks, from 20 to 30 cents; chickens, from 30 to 45 cents; butter, fresh, from 20 to 23 cents; do. by the tub, from 14 to 17 cents; hay, from 40 to 50 cents; oats, from 28 to 29 cents.

AMPUTATION OF A LIMB INJURED EIGHT YEARS AGO.—The *New Glasgow*, N. S. "Chronicle," of this week, reports that a young man, Freeman McKean, son of Samuel McKean, Esq., of Melrose, St. Mary's, recently had his leg amputated above the knee. The amputation was rendered necessary from injuries received on the knee eight years ago, which had become diseased, causing great suffering. The young man had previously submitted to a very trying operation in the Hospital at Halifax, but obtained no relief. He is considered out of danger now, and expects to be able to move about ere long.

ON the 31st ult., a man named Theophilus McMullin was killed by the falling of a tree, at Georgetown Road, Lot 50. It appears that the deceased, in company with Mr. Patrick Cairns were cutting a tree each which lodged one in the other, the former went to dislodge them, and when in the act of doing so the tree fell suddenly, a large branch of one of them struck the deceased on the head and mashed it in, causing instantaneous death. Mr. Cairns being a short distance from the deceased, and there being some bushes between them, could not see what occurred, and was very near being struck himself with another branch. He called out to the deceased, and not receiving a reply went to where he was lying, and to his horror, found that life had departed. He turned the head of the deceased to see if any life remained, but he was still in death.

Despatches from Dublin represent that some indignation is expressed there by the Home Rulers and Nationalists in consequence of the refusal of the Home Secretary to grant the application of the wife of O'Donovan Rossa for permission for her husband to return home to die. It is said that Rossa's health is completely undermined; that his recovery is out of the question, and that the few months of life still remaining to him could only be prolonged for a little while by his return to his native land. Mrs. Rossa, in making her application to the Home Secretary, said that she would undertake on the part of her husband's friends to warrant that no political demonstration should attend his arrival in Ireland, and that he merely desired to come home to die. Mr. Cross peremptorily refused the petition.

AFGHANISTAN.

OTTAWA, Jan. 6.

It is contemplated to re-organize the staff of the militia, both at headquarters and in several military districts. There will be important changes in the personnel of the staff, involving a large reduction of expenditure.

The Princess Louise, accompanied by Lady Sophia Macnamara, paid a visit to Topley's studio to-day, and sat for portraits, to form part of a composition picture by Notman, of Montreal.

The rumor to the effect that the Government intends dropping the Georgian Bay Branch, is revived. According to this, the original Canada Central Railroad is to be extended to Lake Nipissing; and French River being made navigable, it will form the connecting line with Georgian Bay, and do away with the necessity for this branch line.

Mr. McIntosh, editor of the "Citizen," was elected Mayor of Ottawa to-day by four hundred majority.

LONDON, Jan. 6.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs that Syad Mahomed, Chief of Kurum Valley, is expected at Jellalabad early this week.

Wali Mahomet has refused to obey Yanoob Khan's call to Cabul.

Some of Shere Ali's body guard that accompanied him to Turrestan, have deserted and returned to their homes.

County Line Notes.

This place has improved its complexion since New Year's Day, as the bare ground is nicely covered with snow to make the best of travelling.

Mr. J. W. Hughes, of the Dominion House, has been doing a stirring business, dealing out the Christmas and New Year's goods.

An addition will shortly be made to the Station House, which will greatly add to the importance of this place.

The new vessels registered at Halifax, the past year, numbered 24, of which three were barques, one brigantine, and twenty schooners, making a total tonnage of 3,654. The ships transferred from other ports, and those registered *de novo* are 29, of which 8 were steamers (chiefly tugs), 1 barquentine, 4 brigantines and 16 schooners, making a total of 2,874 tons.

During the year ending Dec. 31st, there were 2,658 persons committed to jail for criminal offences in Toronto. The commitments for the year 1877 were about the same; while in 1876 they were considerably over 3,000.

A former Montreal policeman, James Keough, who left that city force some sixteen years ago, is now worth \$200,000 in Chicago. He attended to business steadily, purchased some land on Blue Island avenue, sold at a large profit to Street Car Company, became extensively interested in the Company, and now is worth the fortune stated.

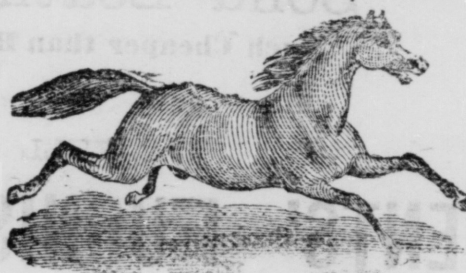
