MONTREAL (CP) — Three players and a referee were named to the Hockey Hall of Fame Tuesday.

They are retiree Bobby Hewitson of Toronto, and players Ebbie Goodfellow of Ottawa, Joe Primeau of Toronto and Earl (Babe) Seibert of Kitchener, Ont.

The selections were announced by Frank J. Selke, managing director of Montreal Canadiens, at the National Hockey League's annual meeting here.

Hewitson, a Toronto sports writer who refereed in the NHL in the 1930s, was also once a member of Canada's Olympic lacrosse team.

Primeau, a native of Lindsay, Ont., is the only man in Canadian hockey to have coached championship teams in Memorial, Allan and Stanley Cup competitions. He played and coached at Toronto.

Seibert, who played with New York, Chicago and Detroit as a crashing defenceman, is the only person to be named whose father is a member of the Hockey Hall of Fame. His father was the late Oliver Seibert. Seibert was named to NHL all-star teams 10 times.

Goodfellow was a high-scoring forward with Detroit during the 1930s.

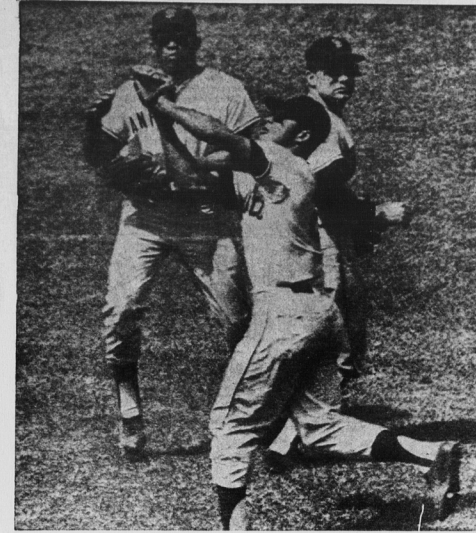
