SOME RULES OF THE GAME

STUDENT UNION ELECTIONS, by Nancy MacMillan

Nomination polls are now closed for the 1980 Student Union Elections. The election will be held on March 17th 3:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in Robertson Library. Voter eligibility is as follows:

- any student who is an active member of the UPEI student union on the day of the election
- a student may only vote once
- each voter is eligible to cast one vote only for each seat being contested, except for the position of Senate, where two representatives are required, so two votes may be cast.

Following are rules which will be enforced for the Student Union elections:

- During polling hours the Chief Electoral Officer or her workers will not permit loitering in the polling stations by unauthorized persons. Any agent or scrutineer may request enforcement of this regulation.
- Counting of ballots will be under the supervision of the Chief Electoral Officer as well as each candidate's authorized scrutineers.
- The Chief Electoral Officer will declare successful candidates and the results and total votes cast will be published and posted on all main bulletin boards as soon as twenty-four hours after the polling station closes.
- All election posters and propaganda must be removed and cease the night (11:55) before the election March 16, 1980 (Sunday) excepting in

the case of pins, which will not be allowed inside the designated polling area on the day of the election. Presence of such articles will result in disqualified candidate votes. That is, that person wearing the button will lose his/her vote.

- In event of a tie, the Chief Electoral Officer will declare another election to take place within forty-eight hours. The candidates from the tie vote will be the only candidates in the run-off.
- Any candidate found to have received money or services from any non-union organization, directly or indirectly, shall be declared null and void.

Let's all get out and vote to make this election successful.

In 1980, as every year, student apathy raises its ugly head during the Student Union elections. This time around six candidates (5 Arts Reps and 1 Science Rep) have been ushered into office because no one cared enough to oppose them.
