Such a case as the following is never referred to by our modern "Samaritan." Some months since during the progress of the service in the Baptist Mission Hall, on Chestnut street, a poor drunken woman, driven to desperation by the cruelty of a non-church going husband, staggered in. She was at once made as comfortable as possible. At the close of the service she was accompanied to her poverty-stricken, desolate home by Christian ladies, watched over, provided for, sympathized with in her efforts to reform. I know that this is not a solitary instance, nor are these confined to the Church and Mission above referred to by any means. This critic of churches and their work, not being a representative of the good Samaritan, but that other class, it is hardly to be expected that he should notice cases such as the above. Struck By Lightning. REMARKABLE ESCAPE OF THE BARKEETINE FLORENCE.

The St. John's, Nfld., Herald of the 22nd ult., says: The barkentine Florence, Capt. Facey, arrived here from Sydney last night with a cargo of coal. She arrived at that port from Pernambuco, and on the way had a remarkably narrow escape from being destroyed by lightning. The facts as we got them from the captain and mate, Mr. Chase, are as follows: On Monday, Oct. 17th, about 7 45 a. m., in lat. 33.57 and lon. 53.30, amidst a severe cyclone, which had been raging for nearly twenty-four hours and had caused great anxiety and trouble to the captain and crew, a bolt of lightning struck the ship's mizzenmast and came down by the backstays on either side and spread itself all over the ship. The captain was standing on the skylight, and the mate and boatswain, John Pitcher, were conversing at the rail, the latter resting against the starboard mizzen rigging. When the electric fluid flashed down it completely deprived the three of their eyesight for at least two or three minutes, and left them almost senseless and speechless. The lightning traversed the whole ship, ate its way along by the bolts and stanchions supporting the ornamental network on either side, charred and burned the lower rigging, portions of the bulwarks, etc., and left visible traces of its presence all about. The man at the wheel fell down overpowered with the shock, and the stove therein rent in pieces. The cabin was filled with a thick, choking, sulphurous smoke, almost impossible to breathe, and it was thought the ship was on fire, but fortunately that calamity was avoided. The escape of the boatswain was miraculous. The fluid traversed the backstay within a few inches of his body and charred a portion of the rigging against which he was standing, so that he reckons himself exceedingly fortunate in escaping with his life, while the others are thankful that in this dreadful danger their eyesight was spared. The outbreak was followed by a whirlwind, with water-spouts and a deluge of rain, after which the weather improved.

The Prisoner Was Liberated.

THE CANADIAN COMMISSIONER IN FRANCE SUCCESSFULLY INTERCEDES.

The Hon. Hector Fabre, Canadian Commissioner in France, has succeeded in getting a Canadian-Frenchman out of jail under peculiar circumstances. Valdey-Dumaine, a young Frenchman, who for some years was night watchman at the parliament buildings at Quebec, went home to Janiot, D'Argeuse, to visit his mother. He took with him his wife, a French-Canadian woman, and his children. On the way out from New York to Cherbourg, Madame Dumaine gave birth to a child. On arriving at home, Dumaine, who had neglected to perform his military service, was arrested and incarcerated at Limoges until he stood his trial before a Council of War. The Canadian commissioner, informed of the fact, wrote to M. de Freycinet, Minister of War, and stated circumstances had prevented Dumaine from benefiting by the Amnesty law of 1889. In answer to his letter, Mr. Fabre was informed by Col. Panard, Chief of the Cabinet of War, that proceedings had been discontinued. The man has been liberated.

SAD AND FATAL ACCIDENT.

A sad accident occurred at Everett, Mass., on Monday, Nov. 21st, by which a young man lost his life. While at work erecting a large building, Albert Howlett fell to the ground and received such severe injury that he lived only six hours after being taken to his home. The deceased was a native of Annandale, Lot 56, where he was held in high esteem by all who were acquainted with him. He left his native Province about four years ago and engaged in the carpenter business at Everett, Mass., where he had up to the time of the accident been very successful. The deceased leaves a wife to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate husband.
