NOTHING DOING AT OTTAWA.

Ministers Absent From Duty.

DANGERS AT THE KLONDIKE.

Important Discovery of Coal.

FATAL ACCIDENTS IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Notes From the Capital.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—The cabinet met yester-
day, but nothing important was trans-
acted. Hon. Mr. Tarte only returned late
in the afternoon, so that the proposed
judicial changes in Quebec were not con-
sidered.

The suggested relief of the Dawson City
miners was mentioned, but Hon. M.
Sifton not being present it was decided to
consider the matter at another sitting.

The name of John Cameron, of the
London Advertiser, is mentioned in con-
nection with the vacant Ontario Senatorship.

Wm. Ogilvie, surveyor for the Interior
Department has returned to this city after
an absence of two years in the Yukon.
He says that if 100,000 persons go into the
Klondyke next spring, 85 per cent. (and
that is giving it a wide margin) will have
to come out. He does not think there will
be a railroad in before 1899.

Speaking of the influences that a
young man is surrounded with in the
Klondyke, Mr. Ogilvie says: "They are of
the worst. There is simply no restraining
influence. One loses touches with the
entire outside world."

Peter's Pence.

St. Louis, Dec. 8.—A cable despatch
from Rome says that there has been a
marked falling off of receipts of Peter's
Pence which constitutes the main source
of the Papal revenue. It is, therefore, pro-
posed at the Vatican to cause to be placed
in every Catholic Church throughout the
world, a statue of St. Peter, together with
an alms box and an appropriate inscription
for the collection of Peter's Pence.

The Recent Collision.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The steamer
Mobile has arrived from London, having
been in collision with a steamer. No
doubt the other steamer in the collision
was the Korean which put into Halifax
two days ago. The Mobile had five plates
damaged on her port bow.

Another Engineer.

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—It is stated here on
good authority that Mr. Adolph Pavie
has been appointed consulting engineer
for the Intercolonial railway. He has
already made a tour of the Government
roads including the line on P. E. Island
and noted its requirements in the way of
rolling stock.

Fatal Accidents.

HALIFAX, Dec. 8.—James Ferguson
was killed in the Springhill coal mines
yesterday, by a slide of stone and clay. He
leaves a wife and family.

At Westville, in Pictou County, yester-
day, a son of Duncan McGregor, a boy of
fourteen years of age, was run over by the
Intercolonial train and killed.

Coal Near Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 8.—Extensive deposits
of coal have been discovered at Dominion
City, thirty miles from Winnipeg, at a
depth of one hundred feet.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Dec 7.—Adverses re-
ceived yesterday from Port au Prince
show that serious trouble is imminent in
Hayti. The streets of the capital are
placarded with "Down with the govern-
ment," and the troops have been ordered
into barracks.

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—A despatch to the
Frankfort Zeitung from Washington says
the republic of Hayti is ready to pay Ger-
many the indemnity demanded on behalf
of that country for the alleged illegal arrest
and imprisonment of Herr Emilie Lueters.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—Owing to a number
of creamery owners not having learned of
the government's bonus of \$100 for the
establishment of coal storage rooms in
connection with creameries sufficiently
early this year to avail themselves of the
offer, the Minister of Agriculture has
decided to offer a similar bonus next year.

REGINA, Dec. 6.—The Northwest legis-
lature has passed the second reading of a
bill to incorporate the President and high
council of the Alberta Stake of Zion, being
duly the organized Stake church of Jesus
Christ of Latter-day Saints. Several mem-
bers' objections were entered against the
establishment of Mormons in the North-
west. The bill passed by a vote of thir-
teen to twenty.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—A despatch to the
Daily News from Shanghai says a tele-
gram has been received there from Chian
Fu asserting that 200 German marines and
sailors, with two machine guns, on Decem-
ber 3rd, entered the city of Kiao Chau, 18
miles from the Bay, and took possession
of the city walls and gates. They were
not molested, the Chinese troops retreating
as the Germans advanced.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—A despatch to the
Daily Mail from Madrid says that the
government has sent detachments of troops
to search the region between the provinces
of Valencia and Castellon and the district
around Morella, where the Carlist agita-
tion is most active.

NEW GLASGOW NOTES.

New Glasgow Division, S. of T., is still
in a flourishing condition, new members
being added to the roll of temperance
workers at nearly every night of meeting.

Great preparations are being made for
the celebration of the jubilee in honor
of the ministry of Rev. D. Crawford, to be
held at New Glasgow, on Thursday, Dec.
16th. The Rev. W. H. Harding is ex-
pected to be present, and a programme ap-
propriate to the occasion will be reu-
red.

It is pleasing to notice the increased
interest taken by the farmers of this
locality in winter dairying. The New
Glasgow factory, under the skillful man-
agement of Mr. Charles Stevenson, is doing
excellent work, from seven thousand to
eight thousand pounds of milk are separated
each week.

Rev. W. H. Harding is expected to
lecture in New Glasgow hall on Wednes-
day Dec. 15th. The lecture will commence
at 7.30, p. m. Subject, "How to be healthy,
wealthy and wise."

A LOVER GETS SATISFACTION.

CHAMBERLAIN, S. D., Dec. 6.—The suit
of Robert J. Ewing against Mathias S.
Drueckler, the father of his sweetheart
for assault, has resulted in a verdict for
the complainant, but has been compromis-
ed.

Drueckler objects to young men keeping
company with his daughters, and generally
the young women's escorts have had to bid
them adieu "at the corner" for fear of
Drueckler's wrath. He has assaulted
several of them.

July 5 he and his two sons caught
Ewing in company with one of the
Drueckler girls, and dragging him into the
house pounded him unmercifully. Finally
Ewing succeeded in escaping.

So severe were his injuries that it was a
month before he was able to be about. He
then consulted an attorney and a two
thousand dollar damage suit was brought.
The jury thought there was good ground
for the suit.
