M.C.A. Defeats Abbies 8-2 In Intermediate Semi-Finals Opener

Maritime Central Airways drew first blood in their intermediate baseball series with the Charlotteville Abbies yesterday evening when they trounced the Abbies 8-2 behind the five-hit pitching of Waldo Munroe. The game was the first in the best-of-five series for the right to meet the Summerside intermediate winner.

Munroe, a big, easy working left-hander baffled the Abbie batters throughout the eight innings that he worked. He started strong, weakened slightly in the middle innings and came on to finish with a burst as he retired the last nine men in order, five of them via the strikeout route. In all he struck out 10 men.

And to back up Munroe's superb pitching the M.C.A. infielders and outfielders came up with almost perfect support on the field and a good offense at the plate.

Charlie Ryan, who went the distance for the Abbies was tagged for eight hits and eight runs but only four of the runs were earned. Shaky defenses by Charlie's mates served to undermine his work.

Big Glen Matheson, M. C. A. third baseman led the M. C. A. attack as he pounded out two base hits and drove three runners across the plate. Matheson turned in a perfect game at field, handling four chances flawlessly.

Munroe also furthered his own cause as he knocked out two base hits and scored one run in two official trips to the plate.

M. C. A. jumped into a 1-0 lead in the first inning when Irving MacKinnon scored the first of his three runs. MacKinnon drew a walk, went to second on an infield out and scored on Matheson's single.

The Abbies knotted the count in the top of the third when Wally Shephard got to third base on an infield error after two men were out. He scored on Jack Cairns sharp single.

M. C. A. went ahead 2-1 in the last of the third when MacKinnon again scored this time on Matheson's infield out. In the fourth the Abbies tied the score with Howard coming across the plate on Reggie Hughes' triple.

The Airways nine wrapped up the game in the fifth by scoring two runs on singles by Munroe.

Reg. Hughes and Arnold MacCallum knocked out triples to account for the longest base hits. Maritime Central Airways, who entered the Intermediate Baseball series as underdogs, looked like the team to beat, out on Memorial Field yesterday evening. Tom MacFarlane's crew came up with their best showing of the season and as far as M.C.A. backers are concerned they could not have done it at a better time. Their fielding was good, their pitching was good and for one of the few times this season they backed up the pitching with some lousy hitting.

In Waldo Munroe they have uncovered a man who looks as though he might be the best intermediate pitcher in the Province. Munroe certainly looked good yesterday evening and the more he worked the better he appeared to get. A left-handed pitcher who throws with an overhand motion, Munroe possesses both a curve and a fast ball. He was using both last night with the curve being particularly effective in the late innings.

Munroe had to be good to handle the Abbies the way he did last night. He had to pitch to six right-hand batters so that the odds were against any left-handed pitcher. He allowed only five hits and four of them went to the righthanders. In the late innings neither righthander nor left-hander could hit him as he set down the last nine men in a row and looked as though he could continue doing so for the evening.

But Munroe, a prize package for M. C. A. on the mound, may be the subject of a hot dispute in the next few days. Last night Danny McCormack, Chairman of the Abegweit Baseball Committee, stated that the Abbies were protesting M. C. A.'s use of Munroe on the grounds that he was not eligible for play. According to McCormack the only players eligible for play are those on the lineup of the intermediate teams on August First. Munroe, who was out of the Province in the early summer, did not return here until August 3rd.

M. C. A. coach Tom MacFarlane, however, states that he was never notified of any registration, registration dates or anything else about the intermediate playdowns. It was also claimed that none of the intermediate teams had been registered up to yesterday. Another spokesman brought up the question of what would have happened about the eligibility of players had the Abbies and M. C. A. combined as one team as was discussed last Friday evening. The question of the eligibility of certain Summerside players under the August 1st deadline might also be a subject of consideration in the matter.

At any rate the matter will be placed in the hands of the Physical Fitness Department and a decision will likely be given in a few days. Such a matter could have been avoided had the two teams been united as was proposed last week. At a meeting of coaches and officials it was proposed last week. At a meeting of coaches and officials it was proposed that M. C. A.'s Junior players be given to the Junior Abbies and that the intermediate players on the Abbies and M. C. A. combine to form one squad. M. C. A. officials were willing to loan their four juniors to the Abbies in the hopes of bolstering the Junior team but a hitch was struck when it came to naming the intermediate team. Under the conditions M. C. A. officials thought they deserved the right to carry the intermediate banner but the Abbie management balked at the idea and the whole scheme was thrown out the window.

But that's all water over the dam now. The big business at hand for both M. C. A. and the Abbies is winning this City series. The second game will be played Sunday afternoon at one o'clock and it will immediately precede the junior game between the Abbies and Curran and Briggs. Fred MacCabe, coach of the Abbie Intermediate is still confident that his team can take the measure of the Airways boys, and he has ordered a workout for all his players at 5:30 this evening.

A former Maritime titleholder Mrs. Harold P. Connor of Halifax, N. S. won the Maritime Ladies Golf Championship here yesterday afternoon by defeating Miss Anne Flemming of Truro, N. B. three and two in the 36 hole final match.

Mrs. Connor, the master of the approach shot and owner of a strong putter, clinched the championship on the thirty-fourth hole when her youthful opponent missed a long putt by inches.

In winning the championship Mrs. Connor reached the climax in her return to Maritime championship play. She won the Maritime title in 1948 and since then, partly as a result of illness, she had not taken part in any tournaments.

But the long lay-off from tournament competition apparently did not affect the play of the veteran Halifax shot-artist. Playing a deliberate game Mrs. Connor came up with consistent golf throughout the match. When she did make the occasional poor shot she recovered nicely to get back in the game.

It was a beautiful shot onto the thirty-fourth green that actually clinched the match for the newly crowned champion. Her approach from over 125 yards out was strong and true and landed near the pin.

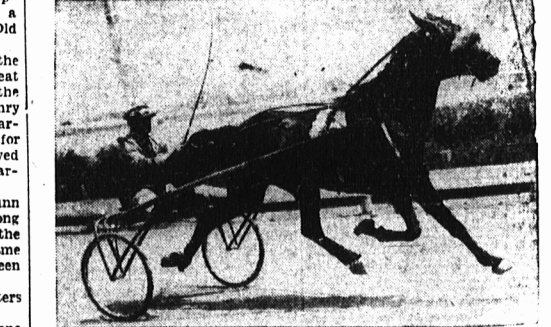
Game Tonight
