London, January 15. The Fenian officers and men who were arrested on 31st December, at Methyler, in South Wales, have been examined and committed for trial on a charge of treason.

It is stated that Prussia has joined France and Austria in their notice to the Government of Servia, concerning its hostile preparations.

The Patrie to-day in a leading article says that the Governments of France and Prussia have agreed to act together on the Roman question so far as to restore the relations between the Kingdom of Italy and the States of the Church.

The appearance of the pamphlet on Foreign Relations and Domestic Affairs of France, which is being prepared by Prince Napoleon, is eagerly awaited by the public.

The approach of the frigate Novara having been signalled, the Emperor Francis Joseph, the Archdukes, and other members of the Imperial family left to-day, on special train, for that city, to receive the remains of Maximilian.

Papers have been found upon the person of the Fenian prisoner Lennin, which, it is said, expose the whole plan of the Fenian leaders for future operations in Ireland.

General Fahey, Commander of the Expeditionary Corps, has asked the Emperor to permit the return of the French troops to Rome, as their quarters at Civita Vecchia and Viterbo are over crowded.

The despatches from Europe this morning state that Italy has appointed a Minister to Mexico, thus recognizing in advance of all the European Powers the restoration of all Mexican Republic.

The Austrian Government is reducing its military establishment. Negotiations between France and Italy for a new Treaty in regard to Rome, are said to be nearly concluded.

The Prussian Government denies the report that England has interfered with the operations of its agents in Romania.

The French Corps Legislatif yesterday passed the Bill for reorganization of the Army by a large majority.

The Government of Servia, whose standing army numbers one thousand seven hundred and fifty, has been reconstituted with by Francis Austria and England, for its warlike policy.
