POLICE COURT.—Joseph Valley, for assaulting Charles E. Robertson on the 9th inst., was given two months imprisonment with hard labor; and the same person for assaulting Chas. D. Collings was given an additional two months, sentence to begin at the expiration of the first term. Joseph Inman, charged with being drunk and disorderly in a house on Rochford Street, on the 10th inst., was fined \$20 or ten days imprisonment. Two persons summoned for allowing their cows to go at large on North River Road were each fined \$5 and costs, fines to be collected next offence. A case of cruelty to animals was adjourned, and a Scott Act case was dismissed.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 10.

Authority was given to-day to call for tenders for an eighteen-knot Atlantic service.

Among the Canadian cable extensions this season will be the connection of Grand Manan with Whitehead Island, and Anticosti with the North Shore.

The Jesuit Act received an airing in the Methodist Conference to-day. Dr. Shaw defended it but was accorded little sympathy. A motion was unanimously passed, declining to accept any portion of the \$60,000 allotted to the Protestant minority in case it should be offered to any Methodist institution.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, June 9.

Another rich strike of gold is reported at Montague.

Seiners off the Coast appear to have a big catch of mackerel.

The Schooner Senator Morgan put into Whitehead with 440 barrels of mackerel and the Schooner, A. F. Walker is at Port Mulgrave with 320 barrels. She could have filled up had she had fine weather.

The large number of mackerel off the Coast has caused a sudden demand for salt in Halifax and the prices of Liverpool salt advanced ten cents per hoghead, with the probability of a further advance.

The Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons met here to-day and elected George W. Wakeford, of Charlottetown, Grand High Priest, and George T. Smithers Grand Secretary.

Quebec Elections.

MONTREAL, June 10.

Nomination for the provincial elections took place to-day throughout the Province, when the following elections by acclamation were announced: Government—Premier Mercier in Bonaventure; Mr. LaLiberte in Lotbiniere; Mr. Morin in Charlevoix; Dr. Rinfret in Quebec Centre; Hon. Mr. Sheyne in Quebec East, and Mr. McShane in St. Ant's Division. Opposition—Mr. Hall in St. Antoine Division, and Mr. Paupore in Pontiere.

Assigned.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., June 10.

The Oriental Mills assigned to-day. The corporation became embarrassed in May, and the Committee on Credits presented a report showing an unsecured debt of \$335,029.28, and quick assets of \$134,313.89. The Committee reported there was in their opinion sufficient property to pay the debt in full and leave a surplus for Messrs. Reid, and recommended an extension of two years, but the creditors would not consent.

The Union Wins.

NEW YORK, June 10.

Walking Delegate Lyons, of the Building Trades Association, says a signal victory was won by the surrender of Peck, Marling & Co., suppliers of building materials. Over a thousand men returned to work this morning, owing to the concessions made by the recalcitrant firm, which has been fighting the union three years.

Colonial News.

MELBOURNE, Vic., June 10.

The Legislative Assembly of Victoria has unanimously approved the scheme for the Australian Colonies and appointed delegates to a convention to consider the subject.
