The Permanence of Religion. It is not uncommon to hear speculations on the permanence of religion. It would be just as reasonable to talk of the permanence of the intellect or the conscience, the permanence of the imagination or any other constituent element of human nature. The vocabulary of religion, its forms and ceremonies, its symbols and organized institutions, have all their perishable elements; but the source of religion is inseparable from the nature of men. Drinking Fountains for Birds.

The Tree Planting and Fountain Society, of Brooklyn, has taken up a branch of work in which it hopes to do a great deal of good. Its latest effort is to secure the erection of fountains for birds in the parks, and in private grounds that are large enough to warrant it. The fountain, designed to supply birds with places where they may constantly have fresh water for bathing and drinking, consists of a shallow basin about four feet in diameter, in the center of which is a spray. The fountain is elevated on a standard to the height of seven feet, thus affording the bird a safe refuge from the attacks of cats. The supports are so arranged that they may be used for climbing vines or movable plants. Similar fountains may be placed upon brackets on the sides of buildings, or in other convenient places, and may be made to ornament a flower garden, a lawn, or a grove. In urging the adoption of these fountains, the society says it is often difficult for birds to get water in dry weather, and in localities remote from running streams the birds may have to travel miles for a drink of water or a bath.—Brooklyn Eagle.
