**EXTINGUISHING FINLAND.**

The eclipse of Finland as a partially independent duchy and its incorporation with Russia are modern instances of the truth that the ruler which does not insist on ruling is the first victim of whatever force may come on top be it palace cabal, or religious tyranny or military clique. Finland has been peculiarly the pet duchy of the Russian Crown. Russians were proud of Finland's record, and her regiments were accounted the best and most faithful, ever ready to fight for the Czar with a feeling of personal ownership in him and his family. The examples offered by England and Germany have reinforced the natural Chauvinism of an Empire ruled by bureaucrats, civil, military and religious; and so the identity of Finland, their soft and picturesque language, their energetic individuality, the useful differences of their characters, between the Swedes on the one hand and the Russians on the other, are to be wiped out, and relegated into books and museums, in order that the huge empire shall present everywhere just the same language, the same dress, the same manners and customs.

The Czar may or may not know what is going on. Whether he does or not he cannot interfere, although the result is to turn the former belief and pride of Finland in him to scorn for him, and to plant the seeds of lifelong hatred of everything Russian in the breast of every Finlander. The state coach is too unwieldy to respond to a driver who has never learned the trick of subduing the horses he is supposed to guide. They are taking him where they will, and just now it has entered into their benighted brains that little Finland is the place to devastate. So the big wheels are in motion, and, while the Czar is perched on the box and seems to handle the reins, they are stamping everything into powder and levelling all Finland to one pale gray expanse, like the long gray steppes from which they come.

Finland with her thousand lakes and ten thousand islands, her sober, reticent, little population, her reminiscences of the heathen past, her ballads of Kalevala and Sariola the gloomy, her curious epics in which gods have become heroes, like Väinö and Ilmarinen, her singular position as a wedge of Turanians between layers of Aryan peoples, has something in her of China. She suffers in silence, like the Chinese, but also she is possessed of a mighty Chinese patience. She has great admiration for learning and is capable of exceeding loyalty to those who treat her fairly. Whether this move of Russian bureaucrats will start a longing among Finlanders to belong to Sweden, the nation to which they have the most affinity through old connections, and the country to which geographically they belong, remains to be seen. If it should be so, the Russians have only themselves to blame. And whether or not they ever free themselves from the people who have violated the oaths with which they bound themselves when they took Finland into the Russian Empire they are certain to have long memories. Suomilaiset who are leaving Finland for North America will not forget the broken faith, and some day will cause the Czar bitter regret that he did not try at least to save his favorite duchy from obliteration.

Indian and Spanish was up to June 30th last, was \$2,000,884,302. From these figures says the Witness, it appears that it costs the United States more to provide for its decayed veterans than both Germany and France combined pay to maintain their standing armies. This army of disabled soldiers and widows of soldiers, genuine and fraudulent, has been named the Pretorian Guard of the Republic, and constitutes a political power with which the politicians have to reckon. Most of them are Republican in their affiliations, though the Spanish war has given the Democrats a showing they did not have before. There was some talk lately of overhauling the pension bureau, with a view to correcting alleged abuses, but it was met with such a howl, presumably from those whose cases could not stand investigation, that the proposition was dropped with haste. Evidently the pensioners know their power and how to use it.

**STRENUOUS LIVING.**

The Philadelphia Medical Record, referring to the illness of President Roosevelt recalls the consequences of King Edward's action prior to the date first fixed for his coronation and complains that instead of waiting for several weeks to elapse after the coronation "the President has been kept constantly on the move, that he was not even allowed to heat up his broken head before he was started on a western trip" and that "the first trip was hardly completed before a second was begun." It is true, says an exchange, that the President seems to have constituted himself a stamp politician, and in the interests of his party, the outlook for which seems in some quarters to be overclouding. Again referring to the King, the Record reminds its readers of the danger of ignoring the effects of what may seem to be but slight affairs. It says "the most robust constitutions may be built to pass with impunity through a disaster such as that which occurred in Pittsfield. A man so near death as the President was on that occasion, receives a shock the consequences of which are not always measurable except at a long distance of time." The President's life is certainly of value to his country, and it should not be risked, as he is a rare type of man, and one far above the ordinary run of "politician" stamp, which is usually considered by a party convention to be good enough for the Presidential chair. It is a healthy national sign that the people of the United States are awakening to the importance of the position of their chief magistrate.
