## NEC Reports Claims Decline

George W. Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Service, said yesterday almost 2,000 persons have come off unemployment insurance benefit rolls during May. The National Employment Service placed 493 males and 441 females in work during the month of May, for a total of 934 placements. These included several men for whom work was found in other areas of the country where their special skills could be more readily put to use. A small number, but a very important segment, were the seven handicapped workers for whom work was found. Without special help it would have been extremely difficult for any of these to find work and Mr. Cheverie had commended for the special Services Section under Francis B. Ashmore.

In addition to those placed by the NES there were many workers who returned to their regular place of employment following the winter lay-off, including the lobster fishermen and those who work for the road builders and construction companies. **EMPHASIS ON MOBILITY**  
Discussing mobility of the work force, Mr. Cheverie said that at the present time the Charlottetown office had over 400 orders in from other parts of the country but that in almost every case these were for skilled workers. He pointed out that work can be found for the skilled worker almost anywhere in the country, and that the 600 who were still on the unemployment insurance rolls were almost all completely unskilled. "The moral here," Mr. Cheverie said, "is very easy to draw." "Skilled men are needed, are always needed; but unskilled workers are becoming harder to place."

### Church Parade Scheduled For City Garrison Sunday

All militia units in the province will take part in the annual Garrison Church Parade tomorrow morning in Charlottetown. Units will assemble at Quaca Charlotte Armoury, and the parade will move off at 10:30, on Water Street, to Queen, to Grafton, to Prince, to the churches of the Army Saint John Central Corps. Major Walker, who has been commanding officer of the Charlottetown corps for three years, will be succeeded here by Captain Ray Nelson, Woodstock, N.B. Before coming to Charlottetown, Major Walker was commanding officer of the Walkerville corps in Windsor, Ont. where services will be held. Units will attend service at First Baptist Church, St. Paul's, and St. Dunstan's Basilica. Following services, the parade will re-form at Hillsboro Square and will return to the Armoury by way of Richmond, Queen, and Water Streets. The salute will be taken in front of the Province Building at 12:30 by Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald. Parade commander is Colonel D.J. McCormack, with Capt. J. D. MacIntyre as parade adjutant. Parade RSM is WO1 E.A. Stanley, MM. Lt. Col. W.T. Hooper will command the Protestant party, and Lt. Col. E.A. McCarey will command the Roman Catholic party.

### Expect Park Site To Be Named Soon

OTTAWA - No delay is anticipated in the establishment of a new park site for a second national park on Prince Edward Island, Solicitor-General Watson MacNaught said yesterday. Thursday it was revealed that an east point location was favored by the national parks branch in Ottawa over three other locations suggested by the provincial government, two in Prince and one in Kings. Mr. MacNaught said the east point location should not be regarded as final and that he intends to discuss the matter with northern affairs and national resources Minister Arthur Laing when he returns from a trip to the Soviet Union next week. The Solicitor-General said the matter was still wide open and that further negotiations would be required between the two levels of government as the province had to provide the land for a national park free of encumbrances. He said the department had indicated the East Point location had some advantages over the others but this did not mean that it would be the final choice. "Establishing of parks is a long term project and it will likely be a few years before a second park is in operation in P.E.I.," Mr. MacNaught pointed out. "But I do not expect any difficulty over the site question and I don't feel it will delay the development."
