Railways and Canals Department.

The Intercolonial Headquarters at Moncton.

On December 1st the following changes will take effect in connection with the Department of Railways and Canals: Mr. Trudeau, Deputy Minister, will retire and be succeeded by Mr. Schriber, who will assume the combined duties of Deputy Minister and Chief Engineer of Railways and thus affect a saving of \$6,000 in salaries.

General Telegraphic News.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., November 28.—Negroes were wild with excitement last night. All the colored churches were crowded with dusky worshippers who every moment expected to hear Gabriel's trumpet announce the end of the world.

NEW YORK, November 28.—It is estimated that between \$50,000 and \$60,000 will be divided between Yale and Princeton as their share of the receipts of the late football game.

QUEENSTOWN, November 28.—In accordance with the new emigration laws of the United States all emigrants booked for passage on the steamer Aurania took oath before a magistrate yesterday that they were going to join relatives in America.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 28.—At to-day's session of the monetary conference De Rothschild's proposals were submitted. He argues that bimetallicism in Great Britain is absolutely impossible, and suggests that the question arises whether it is not possible to extend the use of silver generally, and by this means assist in checking a further fall in its value.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 28.—A terrific blizzard raged throughout the Northwest yesterday, covering five States. The storm was accompanied by a fierce wind, and in some localities the gale drifted snow so that all traffic has been stopped.

DUBLIN, Nov. 28.—In an interview published to-day Archbishop Walsh advocates bi-metallicism as a means of saving the farmers of Ireland from inevitable ruin.

TRENTON, N. J., Nov. 27.—A party of colored jubilee singers from Philadelphia contributed to the Thanksgiving festivities of the young men's Christian association here. They went to a local restaurant for dinner, but were refused service because of their color.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Nov. 27.—The will of millionaire D. Edgar Crouse, of this city, was opened to-night. The Cruse college of Syracuse university, which it was expected he would endow to the extent of \$500,000, was privately secured. Maurice A. Graves, his private secretary, gets \$150,000, connected with his estates. Jacob A. Nutting, and his wife, Mrs. B. Jacoby, a business protegee; William L. Ritter, his valet, and Margaret Enright, his housekeeper, each receives \$50,000. His cook gets \$25,000. Eight charitable institutions receive \$5,000 apiece. All his stable employees receive \$1,000. The residue of the estate, valued at nearly \$10,000,000 goes to the heirs, who number about twenty five.
