history in this province goes back for many years and for this reason a great many of our barns are old, poorly designed and inadequate for purposes of dairying, in many cases these buildings are still sound and still have years of service left in them. On the other side of the coin new barns are being built which may very quickly become obsolete as they are not well designed for the modern handling of cattle. In this connection we think of the "hipped-roof barn" which is certainly a good looking structure but which also is a very expensive one with most of the expense being involved in the storing of hay and straw which needs little protection. This would appear to be an area in which some assistance is indicated in helping farmers to plan their new building with a view to maximum efficiency and minimum cost.

## ATLANTIC AGRICULTURE

APEC has recently released a study on "Agriculture and the Atlantic Economy". This study is a survey of the role of agriculture in the economy of this region.

The study indicates in some detail that the importance of primary agriculture in the economy of the region is substantially less than its position in Canada generally or in central Canada. In terms of contributions to general economic activity and employment, the role of agriculture is declining and declining at a faster rate than elsewhere in Canada.

## Five Nominate For Byelection

NICOLET, Que. (CP)—Nominations for five candidates were received Tuesday for the Sept. 19 federal byelection in Nicolet-Yamaska riding.

The seat was vacated by Clement Vincent, a Progressive Conservative, who resigned to run as an opposition Union Nationale candidate in the June 5 Quebec provincial election.

Mr. Vincent was elected and subsequently appointed minister of agriculture and colonization in the victorious Union Nationale government of Daniel Johnson.

Nominations received Tuesday included: Normand Beaudoin, Conservative; Florian Cole, Liberal; Jean-March Denoncourt, Independent; Georges-Henri Forcier, NDP; and H. Georges Grenier, who gave his party as "Le Droit Vital Personnel (The Vital Right of the Individual)".

Mr. Grenier was not immediately available to comment on his party.

Nicolet is located 60 miles east of Montreal on the south shore of the St. Lawrence River.

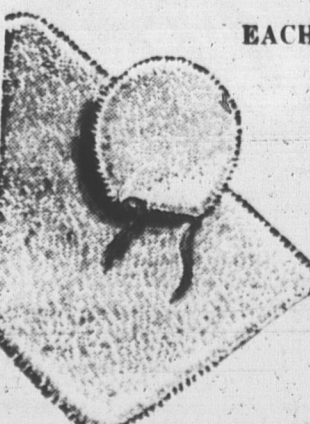
