Newbery, L. L. Beer, and A. B. Warburton, was appointed to work up the matter. Bloody Work In India.

MURDER MOST FOUL.

SIMLA, April 9. A letter has been received here from the leader of the British in Manipur, declaring that the Chief Commissioner, James W. Quinton and all his colleagues who were taken prisoners at the time of the attack upon the British residency at Manipur have been murdered. This news is believed here. There has been further fighting near Manipur. Another British officer has been killed. It is presumed that this officer is either Lieutenant Grant, who commanded the British force which was recently captured at Fort Thabat, near Manipur, or Captain Presgrave, who was in command of the detachment of British troops sent to Grant's relief.

A Disloyal Clergyman.

LONDON, April 9. At the dinner given yesterday by the Devon Congregational Union, at Tavistock, Devonshire, a sensation was caused by the presiding minister, Rev. R. Davis, who said he could not propose the toast to the Queen, and that he would, therefore, call upon the Rev. Mr. Johnson to perform the task. Davis added that he (Johnson) might also toast the Prince of Wales and all the gamblers if he chose to do so. Rev. Mr. Johnson consequently proposed the health of the Queen, and the whole gathering rose and sang "God Save the Queen."

Tupper's Challenge.

LONDON, April 9. The reply of Sir Charles Tupper to Sir Henry Tyler's criticism of his speeches against the Grand Trunk Railway during the Canadian election campaign appears in the Times of yesterday morning. Sir Charles Tupper expresses himself as willing to meet Tyler before the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway Company and make good every statement he made as to the partisan management of the Company. Nobody believes that Tupper's offer will be accepted.

Militia Movements.

OTTAWA, April 9. At a meeting of the Council of the Artillery Association held to-day it was decided not to send a team to Shueburyness this year. The annual Dominion Rifle Association matches will be held August 3rd, and the annual business meeting May 2nd. The Bisley team is instructed to report to the Secretary before the 25th inst.

Hard Fight at Fredericton.

FREDERICTON, April 9. The House of Assembly, with recess for dinner and tea, has been in session since yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. The greater part of the time is being taken up with Blair's Gerry-ander bill of the St. John constituency. At 5 o'clock this morning the house was still in session. The opposition is holding the fort as a protest against the injustice.

The Behring Sea Case.

WASHINGTON, April 9. The President has issued his usual proclamation in regard to the Behring Sea. The argument before the Supreme Court in the case of the schooner Sayward, involving the question of the jurisdiction of the United States in the Behring Sea, has been postponed, as the United States government is not ready with its case.

Legislative Council Abolition.

FREDERICTON, April 9. The Government bill to abolish the Legislative Council passed the House of Assembly here yesterday afternoon without opposition. It is believed that Blair, while carrying the bill in the Assembly, will wink at its defeat in the Upper House.

Strengthening the Garrisons.

BERLIN, April 9. In consequence of the Russian massing of troops on the Galician and Siberian frontiers, the German Government has decided to strengthen its eastern frontier garrisons.

Summer Cottages.

ST. ANDREW'S, April 9. President VanHorne, of the C. P. R. and Mr. Shaughnessy, Vice-President of the same road, have purchased large lots of land here for the erection of summer cottages.

HALIFAX, April 9. Full returns from Hants County give Mr. Drysdale, the Grit candidate, sixteen of a majority over McDougall.

Schooner Seized.

HALIFAX, April 9. The schooner Ocean Belle was seized here to-day by Customs Detective Bonness for an infraction of the Customs laws.
