When found, his clothes were almost consumed and the little fellow was horribly burned from head to foot. He survived for about three hours." Of Special Interest

To Our Farmers.

SKIM-MILK AND BUTTER-MILK.

In feeding skim-milk to growing or fattening hogs, it pays to feed only a comparatively small quantity per head per day. From 3 to 5 pounds per head every day is a more economical allowance than 15 or 20 pounds.

From tests made at the Experimental Farm in 1892, 1893 and 1894 with 48 swine it appears that when a small quantity (about 3 lbs. per head per day) of skim-milk was fed, a less quantity of it was equal to 1 lb. of the grain in the feed consumed per pound of increase in live weight, than when a large quantity (about 15 lbs. per head per day) was fed.

Professor Robertson remarks that from these tests and from other experience in feeding young pigs, it appears that:—

(1.) Skim-milk may form the largest part of the feed of young and growing pigs with advantage and economy;

(2.) For the fattening of swine weighing on the average over 100 lbs. each, live weight, it is economical to give an allowance of skim-milk not exceeding 5 lbs. per head per day;

(3.) In every case the swine fed with part of their ration of skim-milk were lustier, more vigorous and of a more healthy appearance than swine fed wholly on a ration of grain;

(4.) It is seldom profitable to feed skim-milk or butter-milk alone to swine. At the least 30 pounds of ground grain should be fed with 100 pounds of skim-milk or butter-milk.

Are You Short of Grain.

To winter pigs with very little grain mix 1 pk of ground mixed grain or shorts with 1 bu pulped turnips and leave in the mixing box 12 to 24 hours. Pigs are said to thrive on this mixture if kept warm and well bedded.

Our Exports.

The export of potatoes from Prince Edward Island once reached one million bushels annually. Last year it had fallen to 150,000 bushels, and it is expected that the crop will be even less this year. Last year the value of the potato exports was \$37,000, while the dairy exports were five times that amount. The value of the exports of eggs in 1897 were \$62,550; horses \$23,500; cattle \$46,500 and sheep and lambs \$27,700. These latter seem to be taking the place of potatoes.—Farming.

FEEDING FAT INTO MILK

Quite a large number of successful feeders believe that they can increase the percentage of fat in milk by feeding certain kinds of foods, especially by increasing the percentage of fat in the food.

The Cornell Station in an experiment in which varying quantities of tallow were fed found no increase in the per cent. of butter fat. A similar experiment in Germany showed that feeding tallow to milch cows did not increase the percentage of butter fat. The fat content was increased slightly during the first week or two, but disappeared later.

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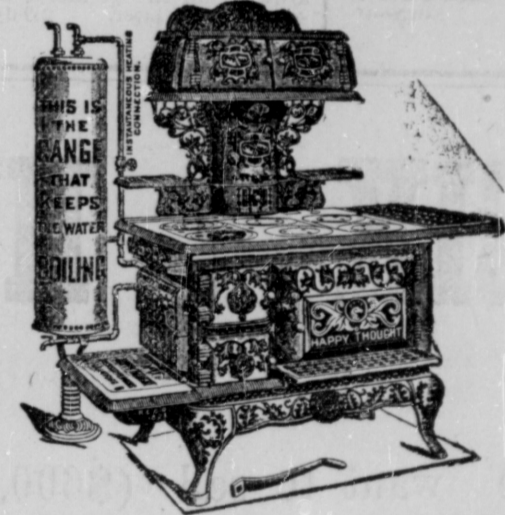
