

Tribe Brass Worried About Wynn's Injury

TUSCON, Ariz. (AP) — Early Wynn can hardly walk, let alone pitch, and that has Cleveland Indians worried.

The 37-year-old righthander may not be ready when the season opens in three weeks.

Wynn pulled a hip tendon while warming up for an exhibition against New York Giants March 17. He hasn't been in uniform since. Part of the time he has been unable to walk.

His injury is the most serious of a rash of ailments that have dogged the Indians.

Vic Wertz, a pinch to start at first base, was ill with a fever. Herb Score, the ace southpaw pitcher, wrenched a knee. Ray Narleski, speedy right handed reliever, broke a finger on his pitching hand. Larry Raines, a top rookie shortstop prospect, broke a toe. Jim Hegan, the veteran catcher, has a bruised and infected hand.

But the injury to Wynn worries Kerby Farrell, the Indians' new manager.

Wynn said yesterday he felt better.

Only first class pitching—with Wynn. Score and Bob Lemon winning 20 games apiece—kept the Indians in second place last season.

During 1903-05 The Silver Seven Ruled World Of Hockey

OTTAWA (CP) — Only a corporal's guard is left today of the brilliant Silver Seven who early this century for three consecutive years ruled the world of hockey.

And only one of them—Harry (Rat) Westwick — survives, who was on the team's regular roster during all three years it held the world hockey championship and the Stanley Cup, 1903-05.

Another original Silver Seven man is H. L. (Billy) Gilmour, now of Montreal, a left-wing wizard in his day. He played all three years too, but in the last year, 1905, saw action only intermittently while attending McGill University.

Bosse Hutton, still hale and hearty in Ottawa, was the team's

goalie in 1903-04. Billy Hague, also goalminder for a time, is still around. So is Dave Finnie, a resident of New York the last 20 years, who minded nets in 1905.

Still alive too are Jack Fraser and Fred White.

CENTRE ACE

Gone is Frank McGee, the Silver Seven's centre ace who spearheaded the team's scoring punch during all three championship seasons. In a 1905 game against the Dawson City, Yukon, Klondiker, after the Klondiker manager had commented "McGee isn't so hot," he scored 14 goals, 10 of them in succession.

Harry Westwick, retired in Ottawa and still sharp-witted at 81, was immediately behind McGee in scoring. He played the now-extinct position of rover on the seven-man team.

Passed into hockey history are Dave and Saddy Gilmour, Billy's brothers. Saddy and Billy for a time formed a famous line combination.

E. H. (Harvey) Pulford saved many a day in his defence spot. He is gone, along with Alf Smith, right wing and 1905 captain; Art Moore, defence; Jim McGee; Hamby Shore; Horace Gaul.

The Silver Seven were the original Ottawa hockey club and adopted their euphonious name in 1903 when team manager Bob Shillington presented each player with a silver nugget.

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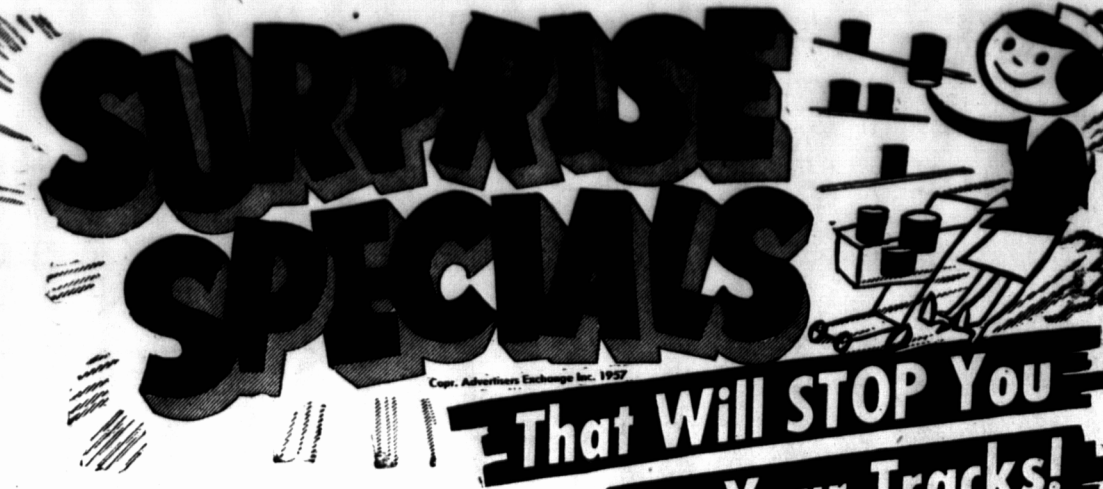
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
