During the same period the quantity of wheat produced has increased 188 per cent; of corn, 105 per cent; of wool, 280 per cent; of oats, 126 per cent; and of hogs packed 196 per cent. At the same time the product of pig iron has been increased 367 per cent., and of iron rails 613 per cent.

THE Rev. Mr. Armstrong who has been 30 years Rector of St. James Church, St. John, N. B., and succeeded his father Rev. John Armstrong, has resigned his charge. He will shortly go to England, the land of his birth, and will reside for a time at least, in London. Although giving up the rectorate of the church and retiring from active duty, he is only going to visit for the present. On Sunday the Rev. Gentleman received from his parishioners a very flattering address and a suitable presentation.

THE *Winnipeg Times* says:—"It is a noteworthy fact that no less than six of the resident Protestant clergymen of Winnipeg are from the Lower Provinces. Rev. Dr. Rice, the new President of the Methodist Church of Canada, is from Fredericton, New Brunswick, and is married to a Miss Starr of Halifax, a sister of Rev. Mr. Starr, now of Whiteby, Ont., and aunt of Rev. J. R. Starr, of this city, also consequently of Halifax. Rev. C. B. Pitblado is from Halifax. Rev. Mr. Pentreath, from Moncton; Rev. Mr. Gordon, from Pictou, and Rev. Mr. Pringle, from Charlottetown."

THE Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Good Templars has been in session in Halifax, N. S., this week. The Order in Nova Scotia embraces sixty three lodges, with a membership of 7,100, being 700 less than a year ago.

THE late special commission having expired, in Dublin, the *United Ireland* styles it the bloody assize, and says of the Walsh trial that it was distinguished from that of Hynes only by its greater atrocity. The jury was so shamefully concocted and its partizanship as indecent, and the evidence was evidence on which an English jury would not hang a dog. This startling language, uttered in the face of the example made of Gray, has produced a profound impression in England and Ireland.

OSCAR WILDE, the famous Apostle of Aestheticism, is to lecture in Charlottetown to-morrow. There will be much curiosity both to see and to hear this accomplished gentleman. The address which he will deliver will be, to a great extent, devoted to an exposition of the origin and progress of the new movement for the cultivation of the "Beautiful," as it has manifested itself in the best circles of English society; and, as it has also manifested itself, among the cultivated classes here. Whatever Mr. Wilde has to say on this topic may be taken as an accurate history of what has been already accomplished in England, and will be peculiarly valuable in indicating what is certain he claims to be, sooner or later, repeated here.

STUART ROGERS, who gives one of his admirable entertainments at the Academy of Music on Wednesday evening, Oct. 18th, has won golden opinions from the press everywhere. The *Review* says of him:—"Mr. Rogers gave one of the most enjoyable entertainments of the season, exhibiting wonderful powers of mimicry, and great skill in the delineation of characters; and the facility and rapidity with which he made the changes in his attire, necessary to represent widely dissimilar characters, were the wonder of the spectators. Irresistible peals of laughter followed the rendering of the humorous selections, and the large audience were thoroughly pleased." Mr. Rogers' impersonation of Oscar Wilde is pronounced true to the life. The costume worn by Mr. Rogers is a *fac simile* of the original, which was duplicated by Mr. Wilde's tailors, expressly for Mr. Rogers.
