Ireland To Launch Big Trade Drive In Canada

OTTAWA, Dec. 8—(CP)—Ireland, land of spuds and linen, has decided to launch a big trade drive in Canada to earn more dollars and bridge a big gap in her trade balance.

Dermot O'Regan, the Irish Embassy's foreign trade adviser, announced Sunday a three-fold plan to make Canadians more conscious of the many industrial goods his country produces:

1. Negotiations are being undertaken with the Canadian government to establish an Irish trade office in Montreal.

2. An Irish Trade Promotion Week will be held in Montreal next March 10-17.

3. Irish manufacturers will participate in the 1953 International Trade Fair in Toronto for the first time since the fair was established five years ago. The fair will open June 1.

Canadian trade with Ireland has been steadily increasing over the last few years but it is sharply one-sided, in Canada's favor.

Canada's exports to Ireland in-

creased to \$21,000,000 in 1951 from \$9,000,000 in 1949, but imports increased only to \$800,000 from \$70,000. Ireland's deficit in Canadian trade jumped from \$8,930,000 in 1949 to \$20,200,000 in 1951.

Canada has been buying some Irish canned meat, raw wool, linen, twine, and leather goods. The bulk of Ireland's imports from Canada are made up of wheat and lumber.

Mr. O'Regan said that one of the big difficulties in Irish trade is that the world considers Ireland an agricultural country. But Ireland produced such other things as glassware, hosiery, lingerie, furniture, worsted fabrics, tweeds and tailor-made clothes.
