Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of P. E. I. met in Zion Church on 3rd inst. There were present Revs. Allan Wm. Scott, J. M. McLeod, Allan McLean, Wm. R. Frame, J. G. Cameron, Wm. P. Archibald, Alexander Raitston, A. S. Stewart, George McMillan, Wm. A. Mason, Ewen Gillies, A. B. McLeod, Malcolm Campbell, A. W. Mahon, W. H. Spencer, Roderick McLean and J. W. McKenzie, ministers, and Messrs. Jas. Stavert, John McRae, Isaac A. Bears, Donald McLeod, Donald Beaton, Isaac Thompson and Alexander Smith, ruling elders.

The committee appointed to visit Murray Harbor Road and adjacent congregations reported that they had attended to that duty and found that the congregation of Murray Harbor Road, though unable at present to maintain a settled pastor among them, wished to retain their congregational identity, and in the meantime to receive such supply of preaching as Presbytery may be able to furnish them with.

The committee recommended that if found practicable, the Orwell section of the congregation of Belfast should be united with Murray Harbor Road, believing that while the self-congregation would thus be made sufficiently large for any one minister successfully to work. On motion, the report was received and approved, and the eastern committee of Presbytery recommended, when visiting their congregations, to ascertain the financial strength of Murray Harbor Road, and also to bring under the consideration of Belfast the proposed union of the Orwell section of their congregation with that of Murray Harbor Road.

Stipendiary Magistrate's Court.

THERE was a large attendance of spectators and culprits at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, and much interest was taken in the proceedings.

The first case called was that of a young man from the rural districts, who came to the city to "do" the gathering of the clans. During the forenoon he imbibed considerable "big injun" fire water, and was feeling quite lively.

The next case was that of a man charged with being drunk and disorderly on the grounds yesterday. The officer who made the arrest testified that the defendant was driving disorderly about the grounds.

Another young man, who while under the influence of too much Scott Act, behaved very disorderly on Richmond street yesterday afternoon, had nothing to say in self-defence.

A somewhat wild-looking individual, who, while engaged in a disturbance yesterday evening, threatened to use a knife on his opponent, was ordered to pay a fine of \$4 or go to jail for 30 days.

A young man who was arrested for being drunk and disorderly on Queen Street last evening denied the charge. He said that shortly after seven o'clock he was coming down the street, and saw a man standing on the corner with whom he was acquainted.

An individual who was creating a disturbance by his peculiar actions on Queen Street last evening was cautioned and discharged.

A middle-aged man confessed to being drunk and incapable at 10 o'clock last night. He was fined \$2 or 8 days.

A boy for violating the market by-laws was fined 5 cents and costs.
