REFORMED FOR TEN DOLLARS

Thirteen Thousand Lives Brightened at This Cost Per Head.

The Lord Mayor of London Eulogizes the Rescue Work of the Salvation Army.

It will gratify friends of the Salvation Army everywhere to learn that the Lord Mayor of London, Sir Walter Wilkie, arrayed in his official dress, has presided at a meeting in the Mansion House at which the subject of discussion was the Salvation Army's rescue work.

"An institution which reforms the vicious or unfortunate at a cost of only two pence each, is distinctly worthy of support," he declared.

In the magnificent hall with its immense mirrors, its heroic pillars, its sumptuous furnishings and beautiful statuary a representative London audience had gathered. The police-masters and brilliant uniforms of the Army's workers were very much in evidence. There were stockbrokers, ministers, M. P.'s and K. C. B.'s, besides the common, everyday citizens of commerce.

Archdeacon Sinclair, the Right Hon. Herbert Gladstone and Lord Blantyre sent letters expressing sympathy with the work. This points to the fact that the 'Army' is not exactly without honor in its own country.

The Lord Mayor made a very sensible speech on the duties of the rich. "Wealth entails responsibility," he said. "I hope you will all lay violent hands on the rich people who haven't done this out yet. Make them realize it. It will do them good."

MRS. BOOTH'S STORY OF THE WORK. Mrs. Bramwell Booth is the chief manager of the Army's rescue work. There are thirty-three rescue homes in Great Britain and forty-five in other parts of the world. Canada has some, but not enough. At each of these homes friendly hands are extended to unfortunate women.

"I always say I have a very large family," began Mrs. Booth, "seven at home, and seven thousand in different parts of the world." The latest figures represent the number of those who have been generally reformed in the 'Army's' rescue homes. "Every year three thousand women pass through our institutions and of these we find that seventy-five per cent remain upright and respectable when they get home."

"You may reform a person," said Mrs. Booth, with emphasis, "but when that person exercises your influence and companionship, think how hard must be the struggle. Oh, the loneliness and hopelessness that one finds in the world. Let me say that desolation causes much backsliding. It is here that our Army is of service. When a woman steps out of one of our homes and goes into a strange district to earn her livelihood, you would say 'she must be lonely, hopeless, all alone.' But no. There are new faces she can go where she will not see the dear old coal-stove and she knows that beneath every such bonnet there is a friend indeed. The beautiful Salvation Army atmosphere is about her.

REALLY HOMELIKE HOMES. "When I say our 'homes,'" I use the words, 'homes,' Mrs. Booth went on, 'Thank God, they are worthy of that sacred name. There is a real human love here, love and liberty for all. We deal one by one with the difficulties in the character of the women who come to us. The idea that it is impossible to transform the most hard-learned spirit never enters our mind; God has so wonderfully encouraged us in the past.

HOMES OF VICKWOOD. There are black sheep. They are always cordially invited to return to us. The black sheep, we say, are worth saving if it took ten times as long as it takes to exterminate. But though we try to enable all who come, our homes in London are generally overcrowded, and we are often forced to turn a repentant sinner away until some more convenient season. We ask for money to build more such homes.

"Now, the cost of the work is not great. It comes down to two pounds for each satisfactory case. That sum includes the rent and taxes of our homes, and the support of the women who come to us. The women who try to show them the better things of life. It also includes the support of those who abandon the effort to do right and who leave us after a long or short stay. Every woman has work to do; some sew, some knit and some knit at our knitting factory; some work in our steam laundry. If it were not for the money realized by this labor the cost for each reform would be nearer \$100. Why, in one home last year, there were a hundred and fifty such reformations and the only cost to the charitable public was eighty three pounds. The women carried over two hundred pounds for the cost and a sum of \$1.50 pounds was received as a donation from other women who had been beautifully saved in the same home in previous years. We hope some day to see our rescue homes entirely self-supporting."

There was naturally a very good round of applause at this statement. A work which shows signs of being self-supporting, some day, is a very pleasant and satisfactory thing to hear about.

A LITERARY MINISTER'S TRIBUTE. The Rev. H. R. Hawsley, the noted author, traveller and orator, made a graceful speech. "You, sir," he said to Sir Walter Wilkie, "will never occupy that chair more nobly or in a more noble cause than you have done to-day."

He praised the Salvation Army. "Do you know what society says of the prodigal son today? 'It says—anything is good enough for him. Give him a robe? Oh, no, a dirty old gunny sack is quite sufficient. A fatted calf? No, throw the beggar a crust. I hear a good deal of talk about original sin. I like better to hear about original righteousness. And here, let me say, is where General Booth and his officers shine. They seem to have a divine inability to see anything wholly irredeemable in man. They have a willfulness to work up the waste material of humanity and make the unfit fit. I have decided," he concluded, "to give up a whole Sunday's collections in my church to this work. I believe it."

The stockbrokers and other persons present contributed \$175 (\$2,385) to help the work along, and the meeting ended. H. C.

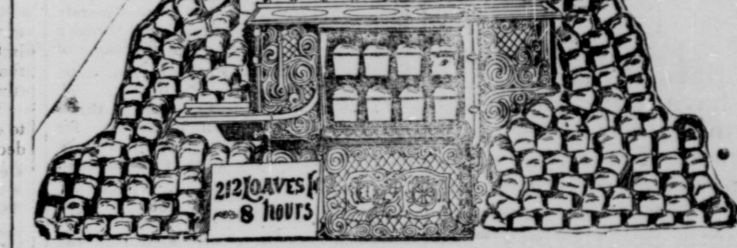
