Lenten Meditation

JUDGMENT

The thought of judgment is more than a single event at the end of time, relate itself naturally to the minds of Christian people. Some of the best known hymns lay great stress upon this thought. It may well seem strange that the season which is a preparation for the Christmas message should tend to dwell upon such a theme. Yet rightly understood the fact of judgment forms an integral part of the Christian Gospel.

Some have not hesitated to speak of the suffering of the late war as the judgment of God, though the average Christian finds it almost impossible to think of the God whom Christ revealed as one who could inflict so dire a penalty on innocent and guilty alike.

But if judgment is seen as the inevitable result of man's violation of the laws of the spiritual world—just as he suffers when he ignores or sets himself against natural law—in this way, and in this way alone, can the world's corporate suffering be thought of as the judgment of God. And it is evident that the suffering cannot be confined to the individuals, or even to the generation, who have set at naught these laws.

But does this conception of judgment, as a moral process rather than a single event at the end of time, relate itself naturally to the minds of Christian people. The essential message of Christ is not that of judgment but of love; but God's love is itself an instrument of judgment, for it has always been the experience of Christians that more than any fear of retributive justice, the supreme manifestation of divine love on the Cross leads them to a deep sense of their own unworthiness, and so to repentance.

In the child born at Bethlehem: in the exquisite simplicity and wonder of that scene is revealed the true nature of the divine "visitation." "God hath visited his people." It brings a message of salvation, of hope, for a world which is morally perplexed and yet deeply desiring to find the things that will make for its peace.

If that season with its thought of judgment, leads men to see anew in the Incarnation the way in which God deals with human sinfulness—not by the method of inflicted retributive suffering, but by the persuasive way of self-giving love—his deepened awareness and his own incapacity and need, will prepare him to understand and receive the cleansing and health-giving message of love.
