Homemade Pickles Are Nice Christmas Gifts

"Watermelon pickle, sweet pickled peaches, plums and Seckel pears; sweet - sour cucumber pickle; spicy sweet-sour celery pickle," chanted the Chef. "Now's the time to make them."

And he proudly set down a bushel basket of produce from the garden.

CHRISTMAS BASKETS

"How about preparing some extra fancy - looking jars for Christmas baskets?" he added. "The following sweet-sour pickles are compatible with fresh pork, barbecued meats and smoked meats such as ham, turkey or chicken."

Measurements are level

Sweet-Sour Cucumber Pickle: Wash and peel 12 large ripe cucumbers; cut into quarters. Scrape out seeds with spoon. Cut cucumber in strips 2" by 1/2".

Dissolve 1/2 c. salt in 4 1/2 c. cold water. Add cucumber. Let stand overnight.

In square of cheesecloth loosely tie up 1 tsp. whole cloves and 1 (2") stick cinnamon; put in 3 qt. saucepan.

Add 1 qt. wine vinegar and 3 c. sugar. Bring to boil.

Drain cucumber; add to syrup.

Boil 10 min. or until translucent. Remove with perforated spoon. Pack into hot sterilized jars. Fill to overflowing with pickling liquid and seal.

Makes about 8 pts.

Spley Sweet - Sour Celery Pickle: Nice with entrees based on shellfish. From 1 good-sized head of deep green Pascal celery pull off outer stalks. Cut off and peel root; slit into eighths.

Cut green and white celery portions in 2" lengths. Add celery root.

Boil 4 min. in 1 qt. water containing 1 tsp. salt, then drain. At once drop celery into cold water to become firm.

Meantime, boil together for 5 min. 2 c. white vinegar, 1/2 c. water, 1/4 c. sugar, 1 tsp. salt and 1 tsp. mixed pickling-spice tied in square of cheesecloth.

Alternate green piece of celery with white piece and pack into hot sterilized glass jars.

Slide 1 bay leaf and small pot of red pepper inside each jar so it will show through. Cover with boiling pickling liquid.

Hot Potato-Celery-Egg Lettuce Salad: Combine and stir lightly 3 c. sliced hot boiled potato 1 c. diced hot boiled celery, 3 tbs. minced onion, 1/2 c. minced sweet green pepper, 1 tsp. minced parsley 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. paprika, 1-3 c. salad oil, 3 tbs. vinegar diluted with 1/4 tsp. water, and 2 chopped hard-cooked eggs. Chill.

Arrange in lettuce-lined bowl. Garnish with cooked salad dressing and strips of green pepper.

Serves 6.

THE CHEF'S COLD PLATTER GARNISH

Roll thin-sliced salami around 2" lengths of Cheddar cheese. Seal with a dot of soft butter and refrigerate.

Wife Loved By Parents Is Misunderstood By Mate

Dear Mary Haworth: I am foreign born, an only child, and my parents lived only for me, with a selfish love, maybe; but they meant only the best.

In my 30s, I married Sid, who was orphaned in his third year, and had no happy childhood. Also no knowledge of a closely knit family, European style. As bridegroom and bride we were very much in love, and lived in the suburb of the European city where my parents dwelt.

But relations between Sid and my father were already strained, due to parental jealousy, perhaps, and to Sid's reserve. He was kind, polite, but cool; usually indifferent. Practically all our first-year arguments and misunderstandings had parental roots.

MOTHER'S ILLNESS

Sid never objected how often I saw my parents or took short trips with them; but he didn't want to see them oftener than once a week. I felt if he truly loved me enough he would accept them regardless. In the end, he did all he could; and we were all happy.

Then Sid and I came to America. We were happy, and he was very much in love. But shortly thereafter I learned mother was sick with an incurable disease; and as I couldn't return to Europe so soon I invited my parents here. Sid was angry that I didn't consult him.

Three months later I left for Europe, to stay a few weeks. Sid was sympathetic at first. Then, as my visit lengthened from weeks to months, some of his letters made me terribly unhappy. After three months I returned home, for the sake of the marriage—because of his impatience and lack of understanding.

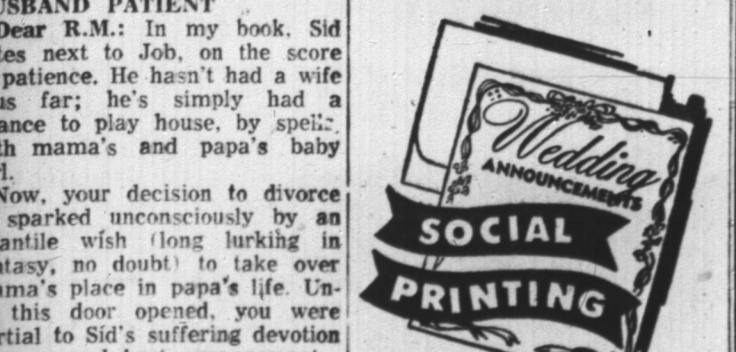
HAVE WIFE'S FEAR

I had wanted to stay for mother's birthday, and though Sid agreed, I didn't delay. My return did no good. Everything Sid did was wrong; our life together was intolerable from mother's birthday on. Two months later I returned to my parents and cared for mother until her death, two months after.

While in Europe I decided to divorce, and my father sympathized. At present I am back with Sid, and on the day of my arrival I told him my intention. He wants me to reconsider, and says he loves me very much; but in view of what happened, I find it impossible to live with him.

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Now, your decision to divorce is sparked unconsciously by an infantile wish (long lurking in fantasy, no doubt) to take over mama's place in papa's life. Until this door opened, you were partial to Sid's suffering devotion as a second best arrangement—because he is one man who proved almost as devoted as your dad, in dealing with your self-tenderness.

It is indeed regrettable that our mother's last illness coincided with your move to America; a move that, in other circumstances, might have weaned you from apron-string clinging, and enabled the marriage to get established, as a real relationship, of adult caliber, between man and wife.
