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# Guide Pins Presented

OTTAWA (CP)—The CBC devoted \$8,050 and 107 minutes of coverage of Gerda Munsinger, blonde centrepiece in sex and security allegations, compared with two minutes and 55 seconds and no cash outlay for coverage of the Queen's visit to the West Indies.

The information was given to the Commons by State Secretary Judy LaMarsh in written replies to questions by Social Credit Leader Thompson.

The replies said the CBC paid \$5,000 to Mrs. Munsinger's agent and \$3,000 to the Toronto Daily Star for a special interview with the woman Justice Minister Cardin says was involved with two or more Conservative cabinet ministers. He also said she once was engaged in espionage activities.

The CBC recovered \$2,000 of the interview payment by resale of film to NBC in the United States. Transportation costs and staff expenses added another \$3,050 to the coverage bill.

Mrs. Munsinger was given 88 minutes of television time in regular newscasts and 19 minutes in special newscasts.

The Queen got a total of two minutes, 55 seconds in regular TV newscasts during the West Indies trip and film on this was obtained without cost from a British agency.

A judicial inquiry has been started into Mr. Cardin's charges.

Referring to Brinco's mining projects, Mr. Borden said Brinco ranks high in mineral development with expenditures running about \$500,000 annually, financed by revenues from the Whalesback operation.

Whalesback, he said, "can look forward to a profitable year in 1966 and shareholders should realize that this project was brought into production without outside aid."

"Brinco continues to look for mineral deposits, preferably copper, in Newfoundland."

While a revenue surplus is beginning to accrue, it must be remembered that if plans materialize, large capital expenditure lies ahead.

# Aid Promised To Ease Effect Of Mine Closing

OTTAWA (CP)—Federal ministers have promised to do everything possible to alleviate the economic dislocation which will be caused by the June 30 closing of the iron ore mine of Dominion Steel and Coal Corp. on Bell Island in Newfoundland's Conception Bay.

Industry Minister Drury said in a Commons reply to Robert Muir (PC—Cape Breton North and Victoria) that representatives of various federal departments are meeting to study urgently the best possible solution for the plight of the people of the island.

Mr. Muir said 850 miners will be thrown out of work and that the closure will be another economic blow to the Atlantic provinces.

Mr. Drury said the government had been assisting in the search to improve the island's economy, which has a high sulphur content. But the world price for iron ore was declining and closure became an economic necessity.

Mr. Drury said consultations have been held with the government of Newfoundland.

Consolidated Edison has run into difficulties with conservationists concerning plans for a dam on the Hudson River in New York state.

The annual meeting also heard from Brinco officials concerning the activities of a wholly-owned subsidiary, British Newfoundland Exploration Ltd.

In answer to a shareholder's question, D. J. McPharland, a vice-president of Brinco, said while nuclear power could be developed in Brinco's market.

Mr. Borden said Brinco executives are "full of beans" and ready to start work. Mr. Borden told the company's annual meeting.

Shareholders and the general public may be impatient for action, but a project of this kind there are many problems to contend with. These are "not insurmountable," he added.

A wholly-owned subsidiary of Brinco, Hamilton Falls Power Corp., has been granted a 99-year lease for water power rights on the upper part of the Churchill River in Labrador.

The corporation plans to build dams on the river and generate about 6,000,000 horsepower. Cost of the project, including transmission facilities in Labrador, has been estimated at about \$700,000,000.

Negotiations with Quebec for transmission and sale of the power to Hydro-Quebec have been under way since 1964.

Referring to the power that would result from the Churchill Falls project, Mr. Borden said Brinco is concerned only with its negotiations with Hydro-Quebec and not with other aspects of final distribution of power.

He said he has no information concerning developments in the United States involving Consolidated Edison.

That company is a potential customer for the power Hydro-Quebec would pipe down from Labrador, once an agreement had been reached for sale of the electricity to the provincially-owned Quebec utility.

### CONTRACT BRIDGE

**BIDDING QUIZ**

You are South, both sides vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North	East	South	West
1♦	Pass	1♥	Pass
1NT	Pass	?	?

What would you bid now with each of the following four hands?

- Spades 10 Hearts K Q 8 6 3 Diamonds K 7 Clubs A J 9 4 2
- Spades J 6 Hearts A Q 7 4 Diamonds 8 3 2 Clubs A K 9 3
- Spades K J 4 Hearts Q J 8 5 3 Diamonds 7 5 Clubs K 8 6
- Spades A K 7 Hearts A Q 9 8 3 Diamonds 9 8 4 3 Clubs 5

1. Three Clubs. The general rule is that whenever responder names a new suit, the responder is forcing and the opener must bid again. Thus, the heart response is 100 percent forcing and North must bid again even with a rock-bottom minimum opening bid.

This principle likewise applies when the responder, at his second opportunity, again bids a new suit. However, there is one exception to this latter rule, and that is when the opener signs off with one notrump after hearing the first response.

In such case, if the responder wants to name a new suit and be sure of getting another bid from the opener, he must jump the bidding. Since South has good reason (a new opening bid facing an opening bid) to insist on a game contract, he jumps shifts to three clubs.

2. Three notrump. With 14 high-card points and a balanced hand, South goes directly to game in notrump. There would not be much point to a three club bid, because a minor suit game is only a remote possibility, and because, even if partner gave a preference bid of three hearts, a major suit game (with only four hearts facing three in North's hand) is undesirable.

3. Pass. There is no good reason to disturb one notrump. Game is more or less out of the question with only 10 points facing a signoff bid which contains 15 points, at most. Hence, the only real problem to be solved is the best part-score contract.

Seven tricks at notrump are likely to be made on high-card strength alone. But a commitment to two hearts, the most practical alternative to a pass, runs the risk that partner may have indifferent heart support and be forced to pass. In such case a bad trump break could cost the part score and result in a minus score instead.

4. Three diamonds. Again we have an opening bid facing an opening bid, but the best game contract is by no means clear at this point. We therefore enlist partner's aid in choosing the final contract by jumping to three diamonds (forcing). The intention is to abide by North's decision. At this point whether he chooses hearts, diamonds or notrump as the best place to play.
