000. The final NASA report said it cost \$84,000,000.
Another report involves Project Ranger failures.
Dr. Edgar M. Cortwright, deputy director of the office of space sciences, commented in testimony to the House space committee on Ranger setbacks:
"Quality controls and the uniformity of standards were spotty."
Ranger is the responsibility of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory at Pasadena, Calif. It is a corporate subsidiary of the California Institute of Technology.
There are scientists at Pasadena qualified to discuss industrial standards. They feel, however, that such discussions should not be attributed to them by name.
They reported launch vehicles had been delivered with water in the fuel tanks and loose soldering left lying around which in the weightlessness of space would float and cause short circuits.
One physicist commented that NASA had become a training ground for scientists, fresh from the universities, and the young scientists often were inclined "to push the state of the art."
