**Police Remove
Concealed Bugs**
VICTORIA, C.B. Victoria
City Police Commission Monday
voted to remove most of the lis-
tening devices concealed in city
police headquarters.
Wiretapping equipment will
be removed from the visitor
prisoner cubicles and other
parts of the building where
they are revealed by search.
Commission officials said.
Only the jail and what is
termed the security section of
the building will retain the lis-
tening devices.
Mayor A. W. Toone, chairman
of the commission, said he
hoped "this clears the air on
this matter and the public need
have no fear of being listened
on unnecessarily."
"I would hope this would ap-
ply to any other public building
in the province of British Co-
lumbia."
Existence of the bugs in the
building was revealed in news-
paper stories last week.
A monitoring system had been
set up when the building was
renovated, enabling police to
monitor conversations in cer-
tain rooms.
Mayor Toone said the lot of
the police is not going to be
made any easier by removing
devices from the visitors' panel.
"I'm not saying the police are
lazy, but they are going to have
to put forward more effort in
obtaining information from cer-
tain persons."

TORONTO (CP) - Aderman
Kenneth Dear, who has been
urging Maritimers to stay away
from Toronto unless they have
a job and a place to stay, Sun-
day night helped a stranded
Newfoundland family of seven
to find a place to sleep.
Called by a Baptist minister,
Mr. Dear took Alfred Chafe, 40,
his wife and five children to the
city's emergency housing shel-
ter.
"This is exactly what I
mean," Mr. Dear said.
"These people keep arriving
in Toronto with high hopes for
a new life and there is simply
no place for them to live."
The Chafes came from St.
John's two weeks ago. They
stayed temporarily with Chafe's
brother in Toronto Sunday trying
to find a permanent home.

**Expo 67 Title
Is Criticized**
OTTAWA (CP) - MP Barry
Mather of the New Democratic
Party said Monday the title
Expo 67 is "meaningless and
pointless" and the exhibition should
be postponed as the Montreal
world's fair.
He said in a statement that
Canada is missing out badly by
failing to call it a world's fair.
"An exposition can and does
happen anywhere anytime but
in all the world there is only
one world's fair. This is Can-
ada's world event."
Mr. Mather, who represents
the British Columbia riding of
New Westminster, said Canada
is stuck with the Expo 67 label,
but the title Montreal world's
fair should be given prominence
in all promotional material from
now on.

Jailed For Killing
DURBAN (AP) - Three Ne-
groes in this South African city
doctors, special nurses and staff
