Air Force Day Program At Summerside Today

—Today is the big day! The Royal Canadian Air Force at Summerside is holding its seventh annual Air Force Day this afternoon. Static displays pertinent to the daily function of the Air Force, will be open to public view commencing at 2:00 p.m. These exhibits have been prepared by the various schools and units of the station and a great deal of effort has been put forth to make them as interesting and presentable as possible.
A committee of judges, composed of Mr. Charles Linkletter, well known executive, Police Chief Peter White, and County Sheriff Hubert Hall, all of Summerside, will inspect the exhibits for originality, eye appeal, and interest. The best exhibit to be presented with the Air Marshal Curtis trophy.
In addition, the various hobby shops and clubs on the station will be presenting their displays, which will also be judged by the above committee.
At 2:30 p.m. a welcome will be extended to the public by Group Captain A. G. Kenyon, C.D., commanding officer R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside. The program will then be officially opened by the Hon. T. W. L. Prowse, Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island.
The aerial demonstration will commence at 2:00 p.m. and will comprise formation fly pasts by Lancaster, Dakota and Expeditor aircraft. One of the major events of the demonstration will be a parachute drop by a member of 103 Search and Rescue Squadron, based at Greenwood.
The public will witness acrobatic displays performed by a T-33 jet trainer and an F-86 Sabre jet fighter, based at Station Chatham. The final aerial feat, and perhaps the highlight, will be a flight through the sonic barrier at a speed in excess of 700 miles per hour by a Sabre jet.
The free airplane rides for those holding the leaflets dropped throughout the island during the past two days will begin at approximately 3:15 p.m.—S.
