SOME PETITIONS FILED.

OTTAWA, March 25. Mr. Flint's bill to amend the Canada Temperance Act, passed through committee yesterday. The bill to amend the Insurance Act introduced by Mr. White, of Cardwell, was read the second time and referred to the committee on Banking. This bill provides against a certain class of insurers being discriminated against, and also compels the agents to take out licenses. It does not include the fraternal societies who do insurance business. The Budget debate was resumed by Mr. Dawson and continued by Mr. Craig and Dr. McDonald (Huron), Campbell, Devlin and Perry. Petitions have been served on Featherstone (Gib) for Peel; Hughes, (Conservative) for North Victoria; Cargill, (Conservative) for Esau House, notifying them that their election will be protested. Mr. Davies will move for a return, showing the amounts paid by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to the Intercolonial for the privilege of running trains between Halifax and Moncton. The House adjourned till Monday.

Intercepting Immigrants. OTTAWA, March 25. T. H. Cross, secretary of the Moosomin Board of Trade, Assinibois, proceeds to Halifax, and will locate there some weeks for the purpose of meeting the incoming steamships, with a view to inducing the immigrants to settle in the Moosomin district.

The Behring Sea Matter. LONDON, March 25. The excitement at Washington over the Behring Sea affair has not abated here. The papers and officials both discredit the idea that two friendly peoples should come to blows over such an affair, when so nearly put to arbitration. Prohibition Commission. OTTAWA, March 25. The prohibition commission has been organized with Sir Joseph Hickson as chairman. A large amount of preliminary business was arranged and the chairman and secretary are to prepare details. They will gather valuable information. Militia Promotion. OTTAWA, March 25. Lieut. John D. Wolfe, of Halifax, has been promoted Captain of the Halifax Garrison Artillery.
