U.S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND, June 22 (AP) — With steel stockpiles big enough in most cases to last another two weeks, the magazine Steel says today any real shortage might be felt after the strike is settled. "When steel production is resumed," Steel says, "it will take a week to get mill operations up to capacity. If by that time consumers' steel stocks have been exhausted, don't be surprised if for a while there is a super priority on steel for defence production. "This would delay the replenishment of steel stocks for civilian goods manufacture. That means the real shortage of steel for some is yet to come. The magazine says the loss of steel through three work stoppages this year is 7,800,000 tons, compared with the highest annual loss in the post-war period, in 1946, of 13,500,000 tons.

WINNIPEG, June 22 (CP) — Coarse grain futures prices generally moved narrowly in dull trading Saturday on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange. Oats and barley brought American interest and some domestic shipping demand. Rye and flax trade also was light. No information was available on overnight loadings of Canadian wheat for export. Prices of class two wheat were down one cent. Prices of I.W.A. wheat were unchanged. Closing prices: Oats — July 79%, Oct. 80%, Dec. 80%. Barley — July 1.21%, Oct. 1.21%, Dec. 1.19% B. Rye — July 2.01%, Oct. 2.03%, Dec. 2.03% A. Flax — July 3.97% B, Oct. 3.98% A; Dec. 3.95%.

CNR Ships Ordered For Mfld. Service

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 21 — Two new ships of the Bar Haven type have been ordered for the Newfoundland coastal service of the Canadian National Railway. E. A. Bromley, vice-president of the Newfoundland and stores announced in Newfoundland today. Diesel propelled strengthened for work in the ice when necessary and powered by Canadian built Fairbanks Morse diesel engines the new ships will considerably improve and strengthen the present coastal service. One vessel will replace the S.S. Glenco which is 52 years old and cannot be maintained in service economically, the other will replace the Clarendon and Corone two small motor vessels freeing them to augment coastal services to other parts of the island. Tenders for the vessels were called from all Canadian shipyards and yards in the United Kingdom. The order has been placed with Hall Russell and Co. Ltd. of Aberdeen which submitted the lowest tender. Of all welded steel constructions the ships will have an overall length of 210 feet, a moulded breadth of 34 feet, a moulded depth to the upper deck of 19 feet six inches. Each vessel will have accommodation for 50 first class and 40 second class passengers and approximately 1,500 cubic feet for the storing of refrigerated cargo. Public rooms will consist of first and second class dining saloons and a first class lounge and bar.

Bullish Tone To N. Y. Stock Market

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP) — A bullish atmosphere was maintained last week by the stock market despite considerable irregularity of prices. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks added 20 cents on the week at \$102.50, 30 cents away from the 1952 high established at the start of the previous week. The last three days the market advanced with the volume of trading well above the 1,000,000 mark. The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange with net change and final price follow: American Natural Gas up 1-2 at 91 5-8, Equitable office building up 1-4 at 7 5-8, Alleghany Corp. up 1-8 at 3 1-2, Missouri Pacific Preferred up 1 7-8 at 29 5-8, and International Telephone up 3-8 at 17 7-8. Canadian issues were mixed in Friday's trading. Distillers Seagrams added 1-2 while Dome Mines and McIntyre each dropped 1-4. Canadian Pacific, International Nickel and Hiram Walker were not quoted. On the curb, Royalite Oil slipped 1-4, Lake Shore was off 1-8, and giant Yellowknife was not quoted.
