Peary Relief.

St. John's, Nfld., May 30.—The sealing steamer Diana, which has been chartered to convey relief to the exploring expedition under Lieut. Peary during the coming summer, will leave for the north about July 15, proceeding to Whale Sound where it is expected she will communicate with Lieut. Peary's steamer, the Windward, which has passed the winter in the Arctic regions. If the objects of the relief party are successful, the Diana will return home about Sept. 15.

Cubans Stand Off.

HAVANA, May 29.—Seven Cubans were paid \$75 each as the result of the first distribution of the money allotted by the United States for the payment of the Cuban soldiers. The cabal of the members of the former military assembly to prevent the soldiers from accepting the gift of the United States and giving their arms is successful therefore, so far as Havana is concerned. It is too early to predict what will be done in other cities and in the interior but the indications are that the money will not be asked for to any great extent. Some arms may possibly be turned in voluntarily.

The Uitlanders' Petition.

JOHANNESBURG, May 25.—The British reply to the recent petition of the Uitlanders praying for the redress of their grievances is to the effect that the petition is receiving serious consideration. While the government is unable at the present stage to express an opinion on the points raised, it declares its general sympathy for memorialists, and says it earnestly desires a speedy and substantial change in their position. It expects that the questions at issue will be conciliatorily discussed by President Kruger and Sir Alfred Milner, the Governor of Cape Colony and British High Commissioner in South Africa, at their coming meeting at Bloemfontein. The Government regards President Kruger's agreement to meet Sir Alfred as evidence of the Transvaal's readiness to satisfy the reasonable aspirations of the Uitlanders.
