BILL WATSON'S YARN.
What'd you think did it mate? said old Bill Watson, as the men gathered round him, looking at the curious deep scar on his left arm; "what'd he leave them pretty marks like you?"

Needle and thread, and soap will repair all damages now; but if you once teach him to shrink from his mother, and hide away his childish faults, that damage cannot be repaired.

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
