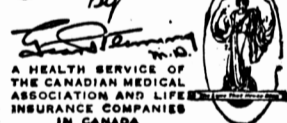

WHY LATE?

A study of some two hundred fatal cases of cancer in one Canadian province reveals the explanations given for the delay in diagnosis which lead to such unfortunate results. "I didn't think it was serious" was the most common explanation. Why they did not think it was serious is seen in other related explanations: "It had never given me any pain," "I thought it was just indigestion (or piles) (or constipation) or some such commonplace condition."

Much of the sad story is told in these simple statements. So many seem to be unable to believe that anything which does not cause pain can be serious. Early cancer is seldom accompanied by pain, and as pain seems to be firmly fixed in the public mind as the inevitable symptom of serious disease, its absence would seem to be reassuring. Pain is a common danger signal, but the sooner it is realized that dangerous conditions may exist without pain, the sooner will more cases of cancer come under treatment in the early stages when cure is possible.

It is quite true that the most common cause of blood in the stools is haemorrhoids. Nevertheless, there is no way of making sure whether the cause is haemorrhoids or an early cancer other than by means of a proper examination.

It is remarkable how many people feel safe as long as they do not know the truth. "I was afraid it was cancer," when given as an explanation, really means "I hoped that it was not cancer and really did not want to be told if it was." Surely this is neither a reasonable nor a sensible attitude towards what may be a life-or-death matter.

There is only one thing to fear about cancer, and that is that it may not be recognized early enough. Any sore which does not heal and stay healed, discharges or blood from any orifice of the body, lumps in the breast, indigestion

Leader of German Movement Resigns

BERLIN, April 9—(A.P.)—Prof. Jacob Wilhelm Hauer, who once called Jesus "an alien teacher" whose doctrines are not good enough for Germans, resigned the leadership of the Germanic Faith Movement today. The resignation followed differences of opinion between Hauer and Count Ernst Reventlow, vice-president of the faith movement, which previously had resulted in Reventlow's withdrawal. "My life work remains the religious revival of our people through Germanic faith," Hauer wrote to friends.

HARRY B. WEBSTER

In the passing of Harry B. Webster on Tuesday, March 24th the community mourns the loss of one of its foremost citizens.

Born at Augustine Cove in 1876, a son of the late Benjamin and Grace (Warren) Webster, he received his education in the Public School and took up farming as his life's vocation.

In his calling he was highly successful, owning one of the finest and best equipped properties in the Province, and his skill as a farmer and stockman was widely known.

As a citizen he will long be remembered as a true friend and neighbor, whose genial smile, frank personality, generosity and integrity stamped him as one of nature's noblemen. In his home he ruled by love and example, a father, yet a brother, a true companion to his wife and children. For a number of years he served his district as school trustee, and justice of the peace, also served in places of trust in his political party, Conservative. He was also an honored member of Mount Moriah Lodge A. F. & A. M. whose members assisted in his funeral service on Thursday, March 26.

The service at the home was conducted by the Rev. J. L. Lund of Tryon assisted by Rev. Arthur Organ of Bedouque and the large gathering of friends bore testimony of the esteem in which the deceased was held.

The pallbearers were four brothers-in-law and two nephews, and who were also brother Masons of the deceased, viz. Nathan, Eber, Fred and McCurdy Bell, Frank and Harry McFarlane.

Surviving is his widow, formerly Lena Bell, and one son, Vernon, three daughters, Jean (Mrs. Lorne Carruthers), Doris and Grace at home.

Interment with Masonic honors was in the United Church cemetery at Cape Traverse where his body was laid beside those of his three children who preceded him.

HOW MUCH FERTILIZER?

What FORMULA should be used with the various crops, and HOW MUCH to apply per ACRE, depends largely on:

The NATURE of the SOIL; possible soil DEFICIENCIES; the KIND of crop grown; and the AMOUNT of BARN MANURE used.

For AVERAGE conditions, one may apply:—

For POTATOES—1200 to 2000 lbs. 4-8-13; 4-8-10; 4-6-10 or 5-8-12 (with or without magnesia), or their equivalent in home mixed chemicals. On certain heavy soils, 5-9-8 seems quite satisfactory.

For TURNIPS—600 to 1200 lbs. per acre 2-12-6 (with or without Borax) or its equivalent in home-mixed chemicals.

Where extra Nitrogen is required 5-10-5 could be used or extra Nitrogen applied over the 2-12-6.

For GRAIN—Seeded to clover and timothy, 400 to 600 lbs. 2-12-6. On extremely poor soils, if no manure has been used on the hoed crop preceding it, a fertilizer sufficiently high in nitrogen such as 5-10-5 could be substituted at rates from 300 to 400 lbs. per acre.

For PERMANENT PASTURES—On LIGHT SOILS or for EARLY GRAZING, 500 to 700 lbs. per acre 5-9-8.

On HEAVY CLAYS or LOW INTERVAL LANDS, 500 to 700 lbs. per acre 2-12-6.

For PERMANENT HAY LANDS—400 to 600 lbs. 5-9-8 per acre.

NEW CLASSIFICATION OF WORDS

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 9—(A.P.)—A new formulation of English syntax in which the old system of eight parts of speech has no place was presented tonight by Dr. Morris Swadesh, a research assistant, before the Linguistics Club of Yale.

Dr. Swadesh suggested that nouns, pronouns, adjectives, verbs, adverbs, conjunctions, prepositions and interjections—the old system—could be supplanted by classifying words into two ways—according to inflection and usage.

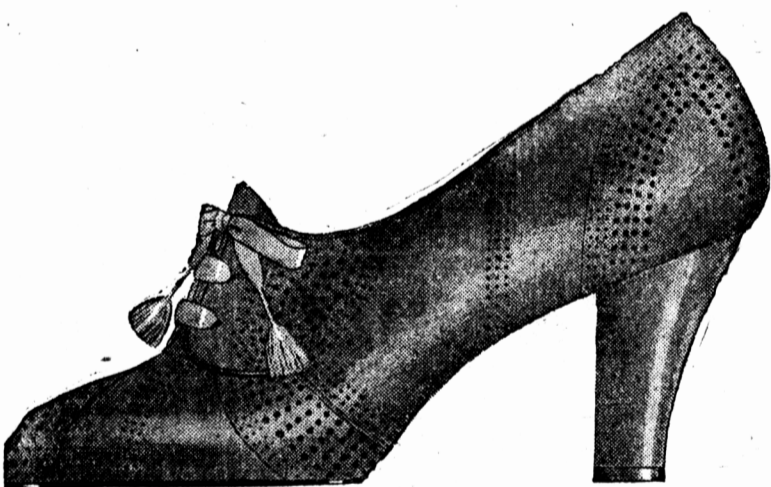
